Stephen Ministry

We care, Christ cures.

I'M SO GRATEFUL FOR STEPHEN MINISTRY!

God's love is always there, but sometimes it can be really hard to feel it, especially when you're going through a crisis. That's probably when people doubt God's presence the most, when their faith is the most vulnerable.

Karen, my Stephen Minister, had arranged to visit me in my home. I had drawn on lipstick before she came over, but no amount of make-up could cover the dark circles under my eyes. Nor could I hide the postpartum depression that had smothered my joy and cause my spiritual doubt. She and I sat together on the couch. I had mismatched socks and tried to hide the wardrobe malfunction by pulling my legs under me. I sat on my feet until they tingled and went numb.

My husband and I had been attending Karen's church regularly, but for me, the hymns felt like mouthed abstractions toward an unseen God. I was swimming in my depression and drowning under the guilt of my declining faith.

For some reason, my doubt felt like failure, like something that needed to be confessed. Like something I should feel terribly sorry for. So I kept my doubt bottled up, and I nodded with the pastor when he preached the gospel, and I closed my eyes when I sang hymns, like maybe I could will myself to believe sometime before the organist hit the final chord.

My wall crumbled that day Karen came by. I didn't intend to unzip my heart that day. Maybe my bonetiredness had started to crumble my wall and I could no longer keep my secrets. I can't say for sure, but I just started to spill my scrambled thoughts.

I do remember the softness of her eyes. I remember the way she put her hand on my arm, like she was expressing God's love in a tangible way that I could feel. I remember, mostly, how my doubt came up and out, like it was air coming out of a balloon. I kept on talking, and she kept on listening and caring.

Before Karen, I had feared condemnation for my doubt. But she held it gently in her hands. She also reminded me that to be a Christian means to forgive ourselves because God has forgiven the inexcusable in us.

Asking for a Stephen Minister is one of the best things I could have done for myself. Karen was what I needed. She said that we aren't made to handle these things alone. Our Lord is a present friend and a ready ear. Trust Him. But also seek a steady shoulder to cry on and a sympathetic person to listen to you face-to-face. That is the power of Stephen Ministry to me. She was someone I could trust who didn't judge or gossip. She was a wise, older woman at church who survived my stage of life and learned valuable lessons in the process. She was that someone to talk to. She was my safe place.

During my meetings with Karen, I found a way out of my doubts. A few years later I began to teach Sunday School, and help with our Vacation Bible School program. Eventually this led to my faith walk and I became a Stephen Minister to encourage other Christian women who are also going through a difficult time trying to figure things out.

I would encourage anyone who is suffering, discouraged, or going through a difficult time to ask for a Stephen Minister. And if someone offers a Stephen Minister to you, say, "Yes!" It really is life-changing.

"Trust in the Lord with all thine heart; and lean not unto thine own understanding." (Proverbs 3:5). Regardless of what goes wrong, always believe that God loves you and cares what happens to you.



\$10,500!! Action Teams supported by Thrivent are making a huge difference and expanding the church budget! The projects listed to the left are the ones that have been reported to the office—there may be more. It is a simple online application for any Thrivent member over 16 years of age. You create a Thrivent Action account, describe what your team plans to do and how it might benefit the community or church or meet a need. If accepted (decision is usually within a couple of days), you will be sent a \$250 gift card along with any tee shirts or banners you might request. A short online follow-up report is expected after the project is completed and you cannot apply for another if you have a report outstanding. Each member is allowed two grants per calendar year and they must be submitted at least 21 days prior to the event.

If you have not used your opportunities, consider what you are doing or can do that could benefit from an Action Team Grant. If you have questions, call the church office.

lightweight cotton t-shirts (no Onesies)

long- or short-sleeved gowns or sleepers (no feet)

receiving blankets (cotton, flannel, or lightweight crocheted or knitted, up to 52")

cloth diapers (flat-fold preferred)

jackets, sweaters, or sweatshirts with hoods (or include a baby cap)

baby socks

dark-colored hand towels

bars of gentle soap

large diaper pins



Baby clothes should be sizes 6 to 24 months and can be gently used if in excellent condition. See <u>https://lwr.org/wp-content/uploads/Baby-Kit-Assembly-Instructions.pdf</u> for more details.




