An elder must be dedicated to God's Word and live as an example to other members. The Elders consists of men elected at the September voters meeting for three-year terms. The terms are staggered; thus, new elders are added regularly. Generally, each elder serves two terms, but the second is strictly voluntary.

Elders assist with worship services in such ways as Holy Communion, Scripture reading, special prayers, and Baptism.

Each elder is assigned a zone consisting of 60-80 member families. Zones are determined alphabetically by last name.

Each elder is responsible as a prayer partner with another committee chair and concerns himself with the spiritual welfare of the person and committee involved.

Regular elder meetings are scheduled at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month.

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What is a Joyful Noise?

Several places in Scripture command us to make a joyful noise unto the Lord (Psalm 66:1; 95:1–2; 100:1; 1 Chronicles 15:16).

The verses that follow explain what that means. For example, Psalm 98:4–6 says, "Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth; break forth into joyous song and sing praises! Sing praises to the Lord with the lyre, with the lyre and the sound of melody! With trumpets and the sound of the horn make a joyful noise before the King, the Lord!"

This psalm goes on to describe the sea roaring, the rivers clapping their hands, and the hills breaking forth in song. The picture is that of all creation joining together in noisy worship of God.

A joyful noise is not merely noise for its own sake. Our world is filled with noise, much of it harmful or distracting.

A joyful noise is a bold declaration of God's glorious name and nature, with shouts, clapping, and other outward expressions of praise.

A joyful noise often includes music, such as singing, playing instruments, and dancing (Psalm 95:1; 98:6; 149:3; 1 Chronicles 15:28).

While there is a time for quiet reverence in the presence of the Lord (Psalm 5:7; 95:6), God also delights in our outward displays of joyful abandon as we worship Him with all we have. Scripture is filled with examples of God's servants praising Him in a variety of ways, many of them noisy and active.

- David danced (2 Samuel 6:14)
- Miriam played the tambourine,
 singing and dancing (Exodus 15:20–21)
- the children of Israel shouted and sang (2 Chronicles 15:14)
- Solomon lifted hands before all the people (1 Kings 8:22)
- Paul and Silas sang loudly in jail (Acts 16:25)
- Jesus was welcomed into Jerusalem with loud shouts of joy (John 12:13).

Self-centered reserve is usually the motivation that keeps us from singing aloud, dancing for joy, or lifting hands in worship when it is appropriate to do so. We fear that we might be seen as undignified or fanatical. At those times, we are rejecting the opportunity to make a joyful noise unto the Lord.

Others excuse their lack of joyful noisemaking by claiming it is not their personality style. However, most of the people who refuse to make a joyful noise unto the Lord think nothing of shouting, clapping, and cheering at their favorite sporting event or music concert.

This year, this season, this day... Let us make a joyful noise unto the Lord!

Stephen Ministry

Our Redeemer Lutheran Church is served by several Stephen Ministers.

Their vision statement is **The Our Redeemer Stephen Ministry prepares and supports laity who provide Christ-centered care to people facing a variety of crises or are life challenged**. A crisis, used in this context, is defined as a dangerous or worrying time; that is, a situation or period in which things are very uncertain, difficult, or painful, especially a time when action must be taken to avoid a complete disaster or breakdown. It is not a foreshadowing of doom, but a time of unbalance, where the trusting relationship between the affected person and God is strained by preoccupation with worldly concerns.

Stephen Ministry can help the person in crisis by establishing a safe haven based upon the love of Christ and the compassion of an empathetic and understanding Christian willing to help the affected work through his/her imbalance through active listening and thoughtful sharing of life experiences, allowing the person to again feel the healing power of Christ's love within his/her life.

Implicit in this arrangement is a process-oriented relationship, not an outcome-based arrangement.

What is the Trivia Challenge?

Trivia challenges are informal, fun competitions where teams battle to see who has the greatest knowledge of trivia.

General knowledge and trivial interest questions are asked by a trivia host and the winner is the team which, at the end of the event, has correctly answered the most number of questions.

How does the Trivia Challenge work?

IMPORTANCE OF BIBLE STUDY

The Bible is the only source of knowledge of how to know and love the Lord Jesus Christ. There is no such thing as "love at first sight" in spiritual things. The believer must get to know Christ very well, and this requires the daily intake of knowledge about Christ through the Word of God, which is "the mind of Christ."

1 Cor. 2:16 "For who hath known the mind of the Lord, that he may instruct him? But we have the mind of Christ."

Phil. 3:10 "That I may know him, and the power of his resurrection, and the fellowship of his suffering, being made conformable unto his death."

Bible knowledge produces sanity and stability of mind. It is very important to get the Word of God into the mind before the times of pressure come. It is not too likely that an unstable person will respond to the Word of God. God deals with the pressures of life using "preventive maintenance".

James 1:8 "A double-minded man is unstable in all his ways."

Bible doctrine is the basis for divine guidance.

Romans 12:1, 2 "I urge you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies a living and holy sacrifice, acceptable to God, which is your spiritual service of worship. And do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind, that you may prove what the will of

God is, that which is good and acceptable and perfect."

John 14:23 "Jesus answered and said unto him, If a man love me, he will keep my words: and my Father will love him, and we will come unto him, and make our abode with him. He that loves me not keeps not my sayings; and the word which you hear is not mine, but the Father which sent me."

Daily Bible study leads to occupation with the Lord Jesus Christ, a daily walk with the Savior.

Heb. 12:2, 3 "Looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith; who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is set down at the right hand of the throne of God. For consider him that endured such contradiction of sinners against himself, lest you be wearied and faint in your minds."

Bible doctrine, learned under the faith principle of applied teaching, produces confidence during the believer's lifetime.

2 Cor. 5:6-8 "Therefore, we are always confident, knowing that, while we are at home in the body, we are absent from the Lord: (For we walk by faith, and not by sight). We are confident, I say, and willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord."

The Bible is the only source of God's viewpoint.

Isaiah 55:7-9 Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts; and let him return to the Lord, and He will have compassion on him; and

to our God, for He will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways, and my thoughts than your thoughts."


Bible doctrine is the basis for orientation to God's plan during the believer's lifetime.


Without the Word of God, the believer's mind will be corrupted by Satan and will become a repository of world-viewpoint and false teaching.





<u>Council and Creeds</u> January 10-February 21

If someone were to ask a Christian today, "how do you know what it is that you believe about Jesus," one would likely point to the Bible or the historic creeds as fundamental references. But there was a time, in the early church, when Christians did not have the benefit of the creeds, and the document we know as the New Testament did not exist! This time period was one of great theological strength where the foundational beliefs of the church were debated and classified.

These seven ecumenical councils are:
First Council of Nicaea (325)
First Council of Constantinople (381)
Council of Ephesus (431)
Council of Chalcedon (451)
Second Council of Constantinople (553)
Third Council of Constantinople (680)
Second Council of Nicaea (787)



<u>Denominations Around our Town</u> February 28-April 10

Drive around America and you will see that churches are plentiful. There is a variety to select from, and in our consumeristic mentality, churches lining Main Street are no different than a variety of laundry soaps in the discount stores aisle.

It's easy to think all Christians believe the same thing, the same doctrine, but the differences are astounding. Baptism, Communion, and free will are all examples of some of the major differences among Christian denominations.

In *Denominations Around Our Town,* the teachings of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and other Christian denominations are examined and compared. Students develop a deeper understanding of the similarities as well as the differences that exist between Christian denominations.

General Epistles Every other Wednesday

For the last year we have been working through the General Epistles. The eight letters of Hebrews, James, 1 & 2 Peter, and 1, 2 & 3 John, and Jude are often called the General (or Catholic) Epistles because they seem to speak to the Christian church in general, rather than to individual churches. They are also united by their interest in practical matters such as organizational leadership, hard work, fairness, good relationships, and effective communication.


The General Epistles reflect the essential challenge Christians faced in the Roman Empire — how to follow Jesus in a tough environment. Early Christians faced problems such as slavery, favoritism, and abuse by the rich and powerful. They dealt with harsh words and conflicts. They dealt with the real tensions between ambition and dependence on God, and the fear that doing things God's way would put them in conflict with those in authority. In general, they felt a sense of alienation living and working in a world that seemed incompatible with following Jesus.

- **▼** Be armed for spiritual warfare through memorization of Scripture passages.

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

SERVING


A small group selects service activities that benefit the church and the community. This strengthens group relationships while reaching out to others in need.

NOTE: The fact that members of Our Redeemer Lutheran Church are reading these books does not indicate that these books are in alignment with the doctrine of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. The discussion guides will discuss doctrinal accuracy and heresy or errors.

COMFORT-TIERS

This is a small group of women who meet in the Fellowship Hall and tie comforters for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) and other charities.

The group meets on Thursdays from 9:00 am – noon. Anyone is welcome to come and help tie for an hour or two or all day. We sometimes use one person to just sit and thread needles for us. We elevate

the tables to prevent backaches. Coffee is provided. We sometimes go out to eat together once a month

If you wish to donate towards the making of these comforters, donations of fabric are welcomed with open arms! We can use:

- Any size or condition (torn, mended, stained--just washed) of old sheets, blankets, draperies, curtains, tablecloths, pillowcases, linens.
- Newer fabric such as yard lengths of 45" fabric (minimum of 3 1/2 yards while 60" fabric requires 2 1/2 yards) or newer sheets or draperies.
- Sewing scraps of any size. Even satiny linings and other silky fragile materials go into the 'middles' for a third layer that helps sift out sand during sand storms if that particular comforter goes to a desert area.
- Unmendable or outdated clothing: We tear out the backs of the legs of slacks. We cut off seams of shirts and blouses, even T-shirts, etc. to use the fabric. Some of our comforter tops have pockets included on them and/or a button or two.
- Old blankets: Worn old ones go into the comforters as 'middles'.
- Heavy crochet thread to tie with. Any yarns are used for crocheting baby sweaters for LWR or knit caps for UI Hospital babies.
- Sewing thread (not quilting thread) of any color, any leftover or new spools.

THEOLOGY 101




THEOLOGY 101

The word theology is derived from two Greek words: *Theos* (God) and *Logos* (work, speech or reason). Therefore, theology in its simplest terms is rational discussion about God. It has been described as "the science of God and his relationship to man and the world" and "the attempt to reduce religious truth to an organized system."

This year's study will focus upon Christology using the book titled "Christology" by David P. Scaer. The book follows the outline and thought pattern of the Lutheran Confessions found in the "Book of Concord". Biblical in its presentation, "Christology" describes the historic Christological controversies as well as more recent debates concerning the person of Jesus. Faithful to the historic and

orthodox understanding of the incarnation, the two natures in Christ, the atonement and the resurrection, Scaer's treatment is at the same time fresh and persuasive.

Meetings are held during the months of January, March, May, and October. The LLL Steak Cookout happens yearly on the fourth Tuesday of August at 6:30 pm. This cookout is at Our Redeemer. 
One important outreach ministry this group supports is 511 Melrose, the meeting place for Iowa City Alcoholics Anonymous groups.



- 5. Participate in a confirmation Spiritual Growth Event (8th grade).


Successful completion of confirmation instruction as described above is an important milestone in your spiritual life and should involve cooperation with your parents, teachers, Pastors, elder, and peers.



Our Redeemer Preschool uses The Creative Curriculum in order to apply a developmentally appropriate academic atmosphere. The fundamental beliefs of this curriculum are as follows:

- 1. Constructive, purposeful play is a vehicle for meaningful learning.
- 2. The development of social competence is a key focus of the preschool years.

- 4. Families are partners in children's learning.
- 5. The teacher's role is vital in connecting content, teaching, and learning.
- 6. All children, including those with special needs, can thrive in an appropriate preschool classroom.

ADMISSION STATEMENT

Our Redeemer Christian Preschool admits students of any race, color, national and ethnic origin to all rights, privileges, programs, and activities generally accorded or made available to students at the school. It does not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin in administration of its educational policies, or other school-administered programs.

AGES

The preschool serves the children of Our Redeemer and our community who are between the ages of 3 and 5, toilet-trained and not yet enrolled in kindergarten.

FAITH EXPLORERS




Faith Explorers are on a three-year study cycle that was created by Shana Stuart.

"Seeing God in Our Sanctuary" consists of studying the six seasons of the church year and recognizing all the symbolism. This includes symbolism throughout the sanctuary as well as in the hymns that we sing. There is a two-week focus on the symbols of Jesus.

"The Light of God in Our Sanctuary" consists of a detailed examination of the 12 stained glass windows, including the relationship they have with the Apostles Creed. Scripture verses are learned that emphasize Jesus as the "light of the world". There is an overview to understand the contributions of Martin Luther.

"The Twelve Apostles and The Great Commission" consists of an in-depth look at each of the twelve apostles that Jesus chose to spread the good news with a focus on the Great Commission that Jesus wants all of us to follow. There is a study on the Last Supper/communion with a focus on Leonardo's Last Supper painting.




Children who are in the three year-old Sunday School class, Preschool A, will be taking some time of their class to practice a few songs they will sing before the program on the assigned day.

ASSIMILATION

To ensure that we are connecting our members to Jesus, His word and each other; reflecting His love in word and deed.

It is God's love that stimulates and sustains us in the exercise of social ministry. Social ministry is a response, not something that we initiate or generate out of our own interests or resources. It originates outside of us. It occurs as we are confronted and affected by others. It's God's love for us put into actions.

ANGEL TREE PROJECT

The Angels Are Coming! Members of Our Redeemer have the opportunity to participate in serving those less fortunate through the Angel Tree Prison Ministry Project sponsored by the Human Care Committee.

Angel Tree is a program of Prison Fellowship where the children of prisoners are given Christmas gifts on behalf of the parent since he or she is unable to do so while incarcerated.

We request the names of approximately 40 children and each is represented by two angels on the tree—one for a clothing item and one for a toy or non-clothing item. The family will also be represented by an angel tag for one or two grocery certificates (depending on the size of the family). Each gift should cost no more than \$25. Each angel tag will identify the first name of the child, gender, age, sizes, gift wishes and when the gifts need to be delivered to the church.

Angels will be available for selection before, after, and between services during the Advent season.

When you select an angel(s), you will be asked to sign out the angel with your name and phone number. Angels occasionally get lost or misplaced during the busy holiday season, so having to register which angel you took will help to prevent someone not getting a gift. All gifts need to be wrapped and delivered to the church.

MITTEN TREE PROJECT

The Human Care Committee also sponsors the Mitten Tree project. This project provides gloves, mittens, scarves, and other items of warmth that are donated to the Iowa City Community School District for needy children. The schools give them to children who need these items to get them through the cold winter. Let's see how high we can stack donations under the tree!

ALL GLORY, LAUD AND HONOR (Lenten Sermon Series)

Lent is a season of soul-searching and repentance. Lent originated in the early days of the Christian Church as a time of preparation for Easter, the day of Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. By observing the forty days of Lent, the individual Christian imitates Jesus' withdrawal into the wilderness for forty days.

Because Sunday is the day of Resurrection, we skip over Sundays when we calculate the length of Lent. Therefore, in the Western Church, Lent always begins on Ash Wednesday, the seventh Wednesday before Easter.

During the season of Lent, the music of the church turns somber, but as Christians we know of God's promise of salvation to all who believe in Jesus Christ. With this promise, Christians rejoice in song knowing what Christ has done for us.

LENTEN PRAYER WALK

Lent is a time of reflection. Join us for a time of focused prayer. In small groups or individually, journey from prayer station to prayer station focusing on the life and death of our Savior, Jesus Christ. This prayer walk is specifically placed in the middle of Passion Week.

ACOLYTES

It is expected that all confirmation students (grades 6-8) serve as acolytes.

The word "acolyte" means "follower" or "attendant". It refers to the fact that the acolyte is assisting the pastor in the worship service in very specific ways.

Here at Our Redeemer, the duties include candle lighting, receiving the offering plates, and caring for the return trays for the communion cups.

TECHNOLOGY ASSISTANTS

We are fortunate to have some of the latest technology devices to enhance our worship experience.

Our sound system helps us hear the Word, message, and music more clearly during the service and also allows us to record one service each week for uploading to our web site so the service can be accessed via computer at a later date.

Our projection system permits a handsfree worship environment and also aids a visitor not familiar with our liturgies to more easily follow along.

Our cameras allow special events to be put up on the screens for better viewing. They also allow a service to be aired on the local access channel on Mediacom each week.

A volunteer is needed at each service to put the correct slide on the screens at the right time. The services are set up on the computer prior to the service by the Director of Technology. Advancing the slides for the screens is not complicated. There are only a few buttons to learn. A second volunteer is needed at the sound board during services.

A third volunteer is needed to operate the cameras for the service being recorded and for other special services.







Worship Services

Gracious Beginnings

Saturday 5:30 pm

From the rising of the sun to its setting, the name of the Lord is to be praised (Psalm 113:3). As evening commences, our weekend worship schedule is inaugurated with **gracious beginnings**.

As we casually gather together in this place, we encounter, experience, and express our joy in response to what God has done for us. We worship by hearing God's Word, remembering baptism, and sharing bread and wine in Jesus' name while lifting our voices high in prayer and song. The melodic tones of the **piano**, and sometimes more instruments, with its dynamic range direct our voices in worship.

God is Our Foundation

Sunday 8:00 am

We hear that "no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ," the chief cornerstone (1 Corinthians 3:11; Ephesians 2:20), and our worship of God is built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets as components of the Divine Service liturgy connecting us with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven. Word and Sacrament is our foundation!

In this Divine Service, in which the worshiper comes face to face with God and talks to him as a child to a father, we respond with prayer, praise, and thanksgiving from our mind, heart, and voice. Our Casavant tracker **organ** is ideally suited to accompany our voices during this service.

God is Our Hope

Psalm 150 encourages us to "Praise the LORD. Praise God in his sanctuary; Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet, praise him with the harp and lyre, praise him with tambourine and dancing, Let everything that has breath praise the LORD."

In this Divine Service, a variety of music swells to fill the liturgy. We sing and make melody in our hearts to the Lord through Christian music, hymns, and spiritual songs, (Eph. 5: 19). Receiving the key note from God, we sing in unison with one voice through Jesus Christ to the Father. As varied as our voices, a myriad of instruments, organ, bass, guitar, synthesizer, and drums, come together in this Divine Service to harmoniously sing praises to the Lord. All praise, glory, and honor to God because He is our hope!
