An elder must be dedicated to God's Word and live as an example to other members. The Board of Elders consists of men elected at the September Voters' Meeting for three-year terms. The terms are staggered; thus, new elders are added regularly. Generally, each elder serves two terms, but the second is strictly voluntary.

Elders assist with worship services in such ways as Holy Communion, Scripture reading, special prayers, and Baptism.

Each elder is assigned a zone consisting of 60-80 member families. Zones are determined alphabetically by last name.

Each elder is responsible as a prayer partner with another committee chair and concerns himself with the spiritual welfare of the person and committee involved.

Regular elder meetings are scheduled at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month.

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"HOSPITALITY"

Our Redeemer's theme for this year will be Hospitality. Hospitality is both a command from God and a blessing we partake in as the church. While the world encourages people to look out for themselves, God changes us into a people of welcoming hearts. Hospitality is founded in the Word of God as we have been welcomed into the family of God through baptism into the life, death, and resurrection of Christ.

Only by being welcomed into a relationship with God, the maker of Heaven and Earth, are we able to welcome others. As ones who used to be strangers to God, we know the blessings of being welcomed into Jesus' ministry. Therefore, we are commanded to be hospitable to the strangers among us.

For this year, we will study the Word of God to see people of the faith who exemplify hospitality in our sermon series.



STEPHEN MINISTRY



Stephen Ministry

Our Redeemer Lutheran Church is served by several Stephen Ministers.

Their vision statement is **The Our Redeemer Stephen Ministry prepares and supports laity who provide Christ-centered care to people facing a variety of crises or who are lifechallenged**. A crisis, used in this context, is defined as a dangerous or worrying time; that is, a situation or period in which things are very uncertain, difficult, or painful, especially a time when action must be taken to avoid a complete disaster or breakdown. It is not a foreshadowing of doom, but a time of imbalance, where the trusting relationship between the affected person and God is strained by preoccupation with worldly concerns.

Stephen Ministry can help the person in crisis by establishing a safe haven based upon the love of Christ and the compassion of an empathetic and understanding Christian willing to help the affected work through his/her imbalance through active listening and thoughtful sharing of life experiences, allowing the person to again feel the healing power of Christ's love within his/her life.

Implicit in this arrangement is a process-oriented relationship, not an outcome-based arrangement.

What is the Trivia Challenge?

Trivia Challenges are informal, fun competitions where teams battle to see who has the greatest knowledge of trivia.

How does the Trivia Challenge work?

IMPORTANCE OF BIBLE STUDY

Why study the Bible? This is both practical and foundational. It is practical because we will learn real reasons why studying the Bible is important, but it is also foundational because it will prepare us for future discussions on the importance of Bible study.

While not an exhaustive list, below are eight reasons for studying the Bible:

- Cultural literacy
- To learn what it says firsthand
- Personal edification
- To help others
- Jesus
- Because it is God's Word to us
- To know God better
- Avoiding error

Cultural Literacy

References to the Bible are found not only in religion, but also art, music, philosophy, literature, law, and more. Knowing what the Bible says is an important part of everyone's knowledge base.

Many popular phrases and figures of speech also find their origin in the Bible including being a Good Samaritan, the folly of letting the blind lead the blind, going the extra mile, ethical maxims such as "do unto others as you would have them do unto you," manna from heaven, etc.

What Does It Say?

Another reason to study the Bible is to learn what it has to say firsthand. Whether one is a supporter or critic of the Bible or perhaps just neutral or uninterested in the topic, history has demonstrated that the Bible cannot be ignored. Considering that the Bible is important to three major world religions – Judaism, Christianity, and Islam – it is worthy of study.

In addition, the recent rise of hostile criticism towards the Bible itself and religion in general also makes it worthy of study. Sometimes the critics do not always quote the Bible correctly or in context. Knowing what it says firsthand and having some knowledge of the context is helpful in understanding not only current events, but key ideas the Bible addresses such as the nature and existence of God, the human condition, the biblical pattern of redemption, salvation, and ethics.

Personal Edification

For hundreds of years the Bible has been read not only as history and God's Word, but also for personal edification. It is full of individuals facing moral choices, life challenges, and, frankly, situations that are applicable to us today. As Paul wrote, "All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting, and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17, NIV).

The Bible is available for us to learn from not only on an intellectual level, but on a personal and emotional level.

To Help Others

We gain centuries of wisdom and are thus able to help others. Proverbs, for instance, contains general principles and ideas to assist people in living their lives in a way that is helpful and pleasing to God. By knowing what the Bible says on different subjects, we can help others through difficult circumstances and encourage them.

Jesus

Some 2,000 years after the time of Christ, His life and ministry remain relevant in our contemporary world. Regardless of how one views Christ, He cannot be ignored. Far from being a distant prophet or irrelevant figure in history, Jesus Christ is the foundation of Christianity. Particularly studying the four Gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John will help anyone gain a better understanding of Jesus and His mission.

God's Word to Us

For people the world over, the Bible is God's Word to us. People inspired by God recorded the words that make up the Bible. God has chosen to reveal Himself not only through creation and conscience, but also specially through Jesus and through His Word. Studying the Bible, then, is a matter of course for those who love God and desire to follow Him.


To Know God Better

Since the Bible is God's Word, studying it is a way to know God better. Through His words we come to know not only the nature and attributes of God, but we also come to understand His plan for each of us. In a larger sense, we also come to know God's plan in history, His sovereignty, His providence, His love, and more.

Avoiding Error

Studying the Bible helps us avoid theological error. The Bible tells us, "Watch your life and doctrine closely" (1 Timothy 4:16 NIV), adding that we "must teach what is in accord with sound doctrine" (Titus 2:1 NIV). If the Bible is our authority for faith and life, then the inspired words it contains will help us to avoid error. In a pluralistic world with many religious and non-religious ideas competing for attention, studying the Bible provides us with a firm foundation in God's truth to negate the errors of the world. Knowing the Bible helps us respond to error and answer questions that skeptics and others may have about it.

Lunch with Brad Alles at 12:00 pm

Brad walks his audience through defending one's faith. Examples of archeological, geographical, and historical support for the Bible are shared, none of which contradict the Bible. Reliability, consistency, and continuity are only a few of the ways the Bible supports the faith.

Renowned archaeologist Nelson Glueck said, "It may be stated categorically that no archaeological discovery has ever controverted a biblical reference. Scores of archaeological findings have been made which confirm in clear outline or exact detail historical statements in the Bible." (Josh McDowell, *The New Evidence that Demands a Verdict* (Nashville, TN: Thomas Nelson Publishers, 1999), p 89.)

Biography: Brad Alles is an Assistant Professor of Education at Concordia University Wisconsin. He graduated from Concordia University Nebraska with a Bachelor's degree in education, and received his Master's degree in Christian education from Concordia University Chicago. Known for his ability to break down Scripture so it's easily understood and applied, adding humor along the way, he is a frequent Bible study teacher at Milwaukee area churches. In addition, he is a featured speaker at state and national youth gatherings, as well as youth worker, teacher, and pastor conferences. His passion for God's Word comes through clearly in his teaching style. His family lives in Germantown, Wisconsin.



BASICS OF THE FAITH

DAKOTA BOYS RANCH Chaplain Rev. Rick Jones

Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch is a Christian residential treatment and educational center for troubled children and their families.

In addition to Residential Treatment Facilities in Fargo, Bismarck, and Minot, the Ranch provides Outpatient Psychiatric and Psychological Services and Spiritual Life Programs. An on-campus school, Dakota Memorial School (DMS), provides a personalized education for kids who have psychiatric, behavioral, and trauma issues.

With the help of highly trained and qualified staff readily available 24/7, children at the Ranch have a structured and safe environment in which to live, learn, and heal. The goal is to teach children skills needed to lead productive, satisfying, and purposeful lives.

At Dakota Boys and Girls Ranch, children have access to an on-site clinical staff including therapists, nurses, psychologists, addiction counselors, occupational therapists, and a psychiatrist. Primary medical providers offer care at each location. In addition to prescribed therapy services, children can participate in our Horse Program, a National Youth Project Using Minibikes (NYPUM), and a greenhouse technology program.






Amid divisive rhetoric, violence, riots, and racial tensions, confusion arises; how can Christians tear down the racial walls dividing our country?




THE REAL MAN OF STEEL



SMALL GROUP MINISTRY



Mission Statement

To grow in grace, Using our spiritual gifts, Through good stewardship For the benefit of the group So that the body of Christ may be built up.

Like nothing else, Small Groups have the power to change lives. They are the ideal route to discipleship – a place where the rubber of Biblical truth meets the road of human relationships.

Small Groups are intentionally formed "communities of care" of 4-12 people that share a common interest and meet regularly in their homes around Scripture, prayer, service, and concern and support for one another.

Small Group Ministry (SGM) has been around Our Redeemer in some shape or form for many years. Small Groups emulate the following five characteristics:

<u>CARING</u>

A small group provides an environment by which members in the group are cared for and nurtured by one another. This includes prayer support, phone calls, encouragement, and resources that will help meet the group members' care needs.

SHARING

A small group provides a friendly and supportive atmosphere where members can safely share joys and concerns, knowing that what is said will be treated with sensitivity and will be kept in confidence.

PRAYING

A small group supports each other by praying with one another and for one another as a key part to the growth of relationships.

GROWING

A small group nurtures spiritual growth through time spent together in the Word, contributing to the growth and maturity of each group member.

SERVING

A small group selects service activities that benefit the church and the community. This strengthens group relationships while reaching out to others in need.

CURRENT GROUPS

We currently have several small groups meeting at Our Redeemer. Contact Denise Holida, church extension 35 or email at smallgroups@ourredeemer.org.

COMFORT-TIERS

This is a small group of women who meet in the Fellowship Hall and tie comforters for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) and other charities.

The group meets on Thursdays from 9:00 am – noon. Anyone is welcome to come and help tie for an hour or two or all morning. We sometimes use one person to just sit and thread needles for us. We elevate the tables to prevent backaches. Coffee is provided. We sometimes go out to eat together.

If you wish to donate towards the making of these comforters, donations of fabric are welcomed with open arms! We can use:

- Any size or condition (torn, mended, stained--just washed) of old sheets, blankets, draperies, curtains, tablecloths, pillowcases, linens.
- Newer fabric such as yard lengths of 45" fabric (minimum of 3-1/2 yards while 60" fabric requires 2-1/2 yards) or newer sheets or draperies.
- Sewing scraps of any size; even satiny linings and other silky fragile materials go into the 'middles' for a third layer that helps sift out sand during sand storms if that particular comforter goes to a desert area.
- Unmendable or outdated clothing; we tear out the backs of the legs of slacks. We cut off seams of shirts and blouses, even T-shirts, etc. to use the fabric. Some of our comforter tops have pockets included on them and/or a button or two.
- Old blankets; worn old ones go into the comforters as 'middles'.

- Heavy crochet thread to tie with; any yarns are used for crocheting baby sweaters for LWR or knit caps for UI Hospital babies.
- Sewing thread (not quilting thread) of any color, any leftover or new spools.

Monetary donations are always welcome. Make checks payable to Our Redeemer Women's Mission Guild and enter for the Comfort-Tiers on the Memo line.

CHRIST IN FILM

For over one hundred years Hollywood has informed and influenced American culture. But what if tinseltown receives its influence from the story of Christ? There are films about Jesus Christ, and there are films with "Christ-figures" that parallel the Christ epic. This Messianic Archetype is a character whose role in the story echoes that of Christ. Christ figures are portrayed as saviors, whether what they are saving is a person, a lot of people, or the whole of humanity. They endure a sizable sacrifice as the means of bringing that salvation about for others, a fate they do not deserve, up to and including death or a fate worse than death. Other elements may be mixed and matched as required but the Messianic Archetype will include one or more of the following: being the Chosen One, gaining a group of devoted followers, being betrayed by one of these followers, persecution by nonbelievers, parallels to the Passion Play, obvious Crucified Hero Shot, a figurative or literal resurrection, and even a Second Coming. 


One important outreach ministry LLL supports is 511 Melrose, the meeting place for Iowa City Alcoholics Anonymous groups.



MEET INGS

UKANDU is a Christian mission organization dedicated to helping youth and adults become the heart and hands of Christ to those in need around the world.

The philosophy comes from Scripture and is reflected in its name. *"I (You) CAN DO all things through Christ who strengthens me"* (Philippians 4:13). And *"For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do"* (Ephesians 2:10).

Dates for UKANDU 2020 will be announced in January 2020. Usually, UKANDU is held the last full week of June in Chicago.



LCMS YOUTH GATHERING (NYG)

Held every three years, the LCMS Youth Gathering provides thousands of youth and adults the opportunity to come together as a community of God's people to learn more about Jesus Christ, the Christian faith, and their Lutheran identity.

During the five days of the Gathering, we will spend time together in God's Word, worship, service, and fellowship with 25,000+ other Lutherans from across the world. This event is organized by LCMS Youth Ministry in St. Louis.

The next **LCMS Youth Gathering** will be held in Houston in July 2022. Registration will begin in September 2021.

FUNDRAISING and PRIZE ACCOUNTS

All Confirmation and High School youth and their families are part of the annual Youth Peach Fundraiser.

Profits from the **Youth Peach Fundraiser** support the Confirmation and High School youth events and activities, including Confirmation Retreats, the LCMS Youth Gathering, and Servant Events.



The **Youth Peach Fundraiser** is the *primary fundraiser* for the youth and earns the largest amount of money to support the youth program.



Each youth (6th – 12th grade) has the opportunity to earn money by helping with the **Youth Peach Fundraiser**. Money earned will be added to each youth's church **Prize Account**.

Prize Account funds can be used as payment towards any Our Redeemer youth activity that requires money.

OUR REDEEMER PRESCHOOL

Our Redeemer Preschool has been fulfilling the educational and spiritual needs of children in the Iowa City area since 1981.

Our Redeemer Preschool desires to nurture children with Christ as the center of their lives. We use the Voyages Christian curriculum to share the gift of the Gospel message of Christ Jesus. Our Redeemer Preschool uses The Creative Curriculum in order to apply a developmentally appropriate academic atmosphere. The fundamental beliefs of this curriculum are as follows:

- 1. Constructive, purposeful play is a vehicle for meaningful learning.
- 2. The development of social competence is a key focus of the preschool years.
- 3. Curriculum and assessment must be linked.
- 4. Families are partners in children's learning.
- 5. The teacher's role is vital in connecting content, teaching, and learning.
- 6. All children, including those with special needs, can thrive in an appropriate preschool classroom.

ADMISSION STATEMENT

SNACKS


Our snacks are through donations. Our snack coordinator will place a sign-up sheet at our Kids Club Orientation and will be contacting parents throughout the year to request donations.

- We use memory work for our everyday experiences.
- Certain facts must be memorized for quick recall and retrieval.
- Memory can become part of our life and this memorized information can be internalized and become part of a student's life patterns and belief system.
- Memory work can assist students to think more sharply and utilize and apply information.

BENEFITS OF MEMORIZING SCRIPTURE PASSAGES, HYMNS, BOOKS OF THE BIBLE

- When this is accomplished, we can look up/quote Scriptural sections more easily.
- Selected Scripture and hymns can be recited to give strength and encouragement in times of distress and pain.
- Memorization reminds the students of their beliefs and provides strength to live accordingly.
- It has learning potential.

Memory selections:


- Are carefully chosen on the basis of their meaning and value for living and sharing the Christian faith.

HUMAN CARE

The Human Care Committee has been active at Our Redeemer for many years. The Committee is quite popular and active, probably because the projects we are involved with are rewarding and fun.

Our present activities include:

PRIME TIME DINNER Sunday, November 3, 2019 12:00 pm

The committee hosts a dinner each fall, with entertainment and/or raffles, for members 60 years of age and older. At the dinner we recognize those who have "special" birthdays during the past year. Special birthdays are 75, 80, 85, 90, etc. We also serve a Wednesday night Advent meal and Lenten meal.

ANGEL TREE

Members of our congregation may take an angel from the tree and provide the gift requested by the child whose parent is a prisoner. Sometimes these may be the only gifts these kids receive. In addition, a gift card for groceries is included in each gift bag along with information about Our Redeemer.

MITTEN TREE

Members of our congregation donate mittens, scarves, snow pants, and hats. The committee donates them to the lowa City School District for distribution to students who need them.

COMMUNITY BIN IN THE NARTHEX

Members of our congregation donate food and paper products. Each week the donations are delivered to the CommUnity (formerly Crisis Center). The congregation is very generous as it amounts to several tons of items each year, including the VBS donation of approximately 800 items.

COMMUNITY SPREAD THE LOVE CAMPAIGN

February is the CommUnity (formerly Crisis Center) Spread the Love Campaign peanut butter and jelly drive. Notices are put in Reflections and Beacon and signs are posted. The peanut butter and jelly that are collected during the month of February are delivered to CommUnity (formerly the Crisis Center) in early March.

SOCTOBER

October is **Soctober**. For people without permanent housing, feet work overtime when there isn't a warm home to return to each night. Socks are not often donated, yet new socks are like gold to homeless people. We ask the congregation to donate new crew socks (dark are preferred) with a reinforced toe. Notices will be put in Reflections and Beacon and signs will be posted. The socks will be delivered to CommUnity (formerly the Crisis Center) in early November.

EMERGENCY FUNDS

Funds are available through our committee, as a grant or a loan, for members of Our Redeemer who may be experiencing a short term emergency. Examples could be a fire, loss of job, medical emergency, etc., when a few extra dollars could help carry someone through. Requests for funds should be made by contacting Pastor Hartwig who will then contact the appropriate people from the Human Care Committee.

BIRTHDAY CARDS

Cards, signed by the members of the committee, are sent to congregation members 60 years of age and older.

CARE PROJECT

This is a program where members of Our Redeemer can contact us if they need some short-time help, such as a ride, small household chores, etc. We have a volunteer list of people who are willing to help when a request is made.

October 6, 2019 Stewards Transformed by Grace:



Who is Jesus? (Advent Sermon Series)



Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and so does the emphasis of this sermon series on Moses's book called Exodus. God's salvation of the ancient Israelites from slavery in Egypt is so amazing that the event becomes the Gospel of the Old Testament. Israel's Scriptures mention the exodus 125 times!

Throughout Exodus, God reveals who He is through His absence and His presence, through silence and speech, through wrath and mercy, and through His judgment and His amazing grace. In doing so, the book paints a beautiful portrait of Jesus, especially as we follow Him along the way to Golgotha and the empty tomb.

A volunteer is needed at each service to put the correct slide on the screens at the right time. The services are set up on the computer prior to the service by the Director of Technology. Advancing the slides for the screens is not complicated. There are only a few buttons to learn.

A second volunteer is needed at the sound board during services.

A third volunteer is needed to operate the cameras for the service being recorded and for other special services.

YOUTH CHOIR







We hear that "no one can lay any foundation other than the one already laid, which is Jesus Christ," the chief cornerstone (1 Corinthians 3:11; Ephesians 2:20). Our worship of God is built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets as components of the Divine Service liturgy, connecting us with angels and archangels and all the company of heaven. Word and Sacrament are **our foundation**!

In this Divine Service, in which the worshiper comes face to face with God and talks to him as a child to a father, we respond with prayer, praise, and thanksgiving from our mind, heart, and voice. Our Casavant tracker **organ** is ideally suited to accompany our voices during this service.

Psalm 150 encourages us to "Praise the LORD. Praise God in his sanctuary; Praise him with the sounding of the trumpet, praise him with the harp and lyre, praise him with tambourine and dancing, Let everything that has breath praise the LORD."

In this Divine Service, a variety of music swells to fill the liturgy. We sing and make melody in our hearts to the Lord through Christian music, hymns, and spiritual songs, (Eph. 5: 19). Receiving the key note from God, we sing in unison with one voice through Jesus Christ to the Father. As varied as our voices, a **myriad of instruments**--organ, bass, guitar, synthesizer, and drums come together in this Divine Service to harmoniously sing praises to the Lord. All praise, glory, and honor to God because He is **our hope**!
