

# Preparing for the Hazards of Winter

Although winter comes as no surprise, many of us may not be ready for its arrival. If you are prepared for the hazards of winter, you are more likely to stay safe and healthy when temperatures start to fall.

#### TAKE THESE STEPS FOR YOUR HOME

Staying inside is no guarantee of safety. Take these steps to keep your home safe and warm during the winter months.

- Winterize your home.
  - o Install weather stripping, insulation, and storm windows.
  - o Insulate water lines that run along exterior walls.
  - o Clean out gutters and repair roof leaks.
- Check your heating systems.
  - o Have your heating system serviced professionally to make sure that it is clean, working properly, and ventilated to the outside.
  - o Inspect and clean fireplaces and chimneys.
  - o If you do not have a working smoke detector, install one. Test batteries monthly and replace them twice a year.
  - o Have a safe alternate heating source and alternate fuels available.
  - o Prevent carbon monoxide (CO) emergencies.
    - Install a CO detector to alert you of the presence of the deadly, odorless, colorless gas. Check batteries when you change your clocks in the fall and spring.
    - Learn symptoms of CO poisoning: headache, dizziness, weakness, upset stomach, vomiting, chest pain, and confusion.

#### **DON'T FORGET TO PREPARE YOUR CAR**

Get your car ready for cold weather use.

- Service the radiator and maintain antifreeze level.
- Check tire tread or, if necessary, replace tires with all-weather or snow tires.
- Keep gas tank full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines.
- Use a wintertime formula in your windshield washer.
- Prepare a winter emergency kit to keep in your car in case you become stranded. The kit should include:
  - o cell phone, portable charger, and extra batteries;
  - o blankets;
  - o food and water;
  - o booster cables, flares, tire pump, and a bag of sand or cat litter (for traction);
  - o compass and maps;
  - o flashlight, battery-powered radio, and extra batteries;
  - o first-aid kit: and
  - o plastic bags (for sanitation).

#### **EQUIP IN ADVANCE FOR EMERGENCIES**

Be prepared for weather-related emergencies, including power outages.

- Stock food that needs no cooking or refrigeration and water stored in clean containers.
- Ensure that your cell phone is fully charged.
- When planning travel, be aware of current and forecast weather conditions.
- Keep an up-to-date emergency kit, including:
  - o Battery-operated devices, such as a flashlight, a National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio, and lamps;
  - o extra batteries;
  - o first-aid kit and extra medicine;
  - o baby items; and
  - o cat litter or sand for icy walkways.
- Protect your family from carbon monoxide.
  - o Keep grills, camp stoves, and generators out of the house, basement and garage.
  - o Locate generators at least 20 feet from the house.
  - o Leave your home immediately if the CO detector sounds, and call 911.
  - Wear appropriate outdoor clothing: layers of light, warm clothing; windproof coat, mittens; hats; scarves; and waterproof boots.



Outdoor activities can expose you to several safety hazards, but you can take these steps to prepare for them:

- Wear appropriate outdoor clothing: wear a tightly woven, preferably wind-resistant coat or jacket; inner layers of light, warm clothing; mittens; hats; scarves; and waterproof boots.
- Sprinkle cat litter or sand on icy patches.
- Learn safety precautions to follow when outdoors.
  - o Work slowly when doing outside chores.
  - o Take a buddy and an emergency kit when you are participating in outdoor recreation.
  - o Carry a cell phone.

#### DO THIS WHEN YOU PLAN TO TRAVEL

When planning travel, be aware of current and forecast weather conditions.

- Avoid traveling when the weather service has issued advisories.
- If you must travel, inform a friend or relative of your proposed route and expected time of arrival.
- Follow these safety rules if you become stranded in your car.
  - o Make your car visible to rescuers. Tie a brightly colored cloth to the antenna, raise the hood of the car (if it is not snowing), and turn on the inside overhead lights (when your engine is running).
  - o Move anything you need from the trunk into the passenger area. Stay with your car unless safety is no more than 100 yards away.
  - Keep your body warm. Wrap your entire body, including your head, in extra clothing, blankets, or newspapers. Huddle with other people if you can.
  - o Stay awake and stay moving. You will be less vulnerable to cold-related health problems. As you sit, keep moving your arms and legs to improve circulation and stay warmer.
  - Run the motor (and heater) for about 10 minutes per hour, opening one window slightly to let in air. Make sure that snow is not blocking the exhaust pipe—this will reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

Above all, be ready to check on family and neighbors who are especially at risk from cold weather hazards: young children, older adults, and the chronically ill. If you have pets, bring them inside. If you cannot bring them inside, provide adequate, warm shelter and unfrozen water to drink.

No one can stop the onset of winter. However, if you follow these suggestions, you will be ready for it when it comes.





On behalf of the Human Care Committee, we thank you all who purchased gifts for the Angel Tree Prison Ministry project this year. With your help, we served 18 families, including 38 children. Human Care committee members delivered 113 gifts to the children and families in Iowa City, Coralville, Solon, West Liberty, Letts, Columbus Junction, and Atalissa. 

#### The Meaning of the Stephen Series Logo

The logo's most dominant feature is the cross of Jesus. It reminds us that Christ is at the center of Stephen Ministry and all Stephen Ministry relationships.

The broken person behind the cross symbolizes how we are all broken people, broken by our own sin and imperfections.

The Stephen Series logo tells the story of a care receiver's journey from brokenness to wholeness through the transforming power of the cross of Jesus. It serves as a simple reminder that it is not the Stephen Minister who restores a person to wholeness. Rather, it is only through the cross of Jesus that a person can be made whole.



The whole person in front of the cross signifies that the wholeness we encounter through the transforming power of the cross of Jesus. It is only through Jesus and His life, death on the cross, and resurrection that we, who are broken people, are made whole.

The circle is a symbol of God's internal and never-ending love for us. God's love surrounds us, holds us, heals us, with the cross of Jesus at the center of that love. For it was Jesus, God's Son, who allowed Himself to be broken on the cross to save us from our sin and give us the opportunity to be restored to wholeness through Him.

Several months back, a friend posted a "New Guinea Impatiens" flower on Facebook. Anita asked me if those flowers were present in New Guinea. I thought they looked familiar, but to make sure, I went outside to "fact check." I was surprised - embarrassed, actually - by what I found. On our property, we had 20 different places the perky flowers were tenaciously and gallantly blooming. Twenty! All without my noticing, much less my nurturing. They poked thru ferns, clung to bare earth, and thrived where the overflow drainage dumped on them. How had I missed them?



Those delightful New Guinea Impatiens have encouraged me to pay more attention to what's going on around me, or more accurately, who's doing what. They've been a nudge to ask, "What's God been up to?" And the answer?

#### "Come and see the works of the Lord."

The teachers at Wamapisa Lutheran School at Yaramanda are developing a Christian Religious Education program. They are working together to write lesson plans using "120 Bible Stories" as a base.



The woman, far left, opens her home to provide temporary

shelter for women who need protection after being accused of "sanguma" (sorcery/witchcraft) or who are in other abusive situations. Violence against those accused of "sanguma" continues to be an unconscionable, inhumane, ungodly, illegal (need I add more?) practice which grows in our midst. We pray for courage to stand against the atrocities and false beliefs.

Ten new pastors graduated from Timothy Lutheran Seminary and were assigned to congregations of the Gutnius Lutheran Church and six vicars were set out. I was privileged to teach a basic health class to the first and second year students. It was good to be in the classroom again.





Tami Waikin, long-time pharmacist at Immanuel Lutheran Hospital, and Pr John Sakatao from Yaramanda, are among those who finished their earthly walk. The witness of their lives continues to strengthen my faith and bring God glory.



To be sure, there have been rough patches, but look closer. God continues to work.



Three separate, appaling fires at Highlands Lutheran International School (HLIS) in May entirely destroyed the lower elementary complex, principal's house, and girls' dormitory. By God's grace, HLIS continued the school year and is rebuilding! HLIS is looking for Lutheran, expatriate principal ....

Our hydro was down for 10 months. Fortunately, our house has solar and generator power back-up so we had several hours of power each day. The final electrical gizmo to repair the hydro took 4 months to arrive, but by late November, Anton and team had it purring again.

Two of our LCMS PNG mission-family colleagues returned to the US this year, creating holes which will not fill merely with shifting responsibilities. But shifting responsibilities and procedures, we are. I will be picking up some of the administrative tasks. God be with the Matro and Ritzman families as they serve our Lord in the US. We thank God for their service in Papua New Guinea.

And with the family — I was able to slip away for a brief visit with family in the US in October. And Yes, I paid Great Attention to the changing leaves and growing grandkids! What a joy to have those special times.

"Come and see the works of the Lord." Thank you to those of you who have been a part of that work in the support you offer me through your prayers, notes of encouragement, and financial support. I see the Lord through your acts of faith.

As Christmas approaches, come and see. This newborn Babe, Jesus our Savior, is not to be overlooked.


