Imagine the faithful women going to the tomb after that saddest of all days when Jesus was crucified. It's very early in the morning, the Gospel writer Mark tells us, when they begin their walk with their spices to anoint their Savior's body.

They're still grief-stricken, of course, but they have another problem: How will they move the huge stone that blocks the passageway to Jesus' burial place? They arrive to find it's already been moved. Well, that's curious.

They enter the tomb, but there's no body!

While they were "perplexed about this," the Gospel writer Luke understates, "behold, two men stood by them in dazzling apparel. And as they were frightened and bowed their faces to the ground, the men said to them, 'Why do you seek the living among the dead?" (Luke 24:3-5).

Why did they look for Christ to be in His tomb? Why were they looking in the wrong place?

Because they hadn't understood the things Jesus had told them before His crucifixion.

Because they were operating according to human logic.

Once someone has died, He's dead.

Of course, they would look for the dead among the dead.

This is a story that cannot be comprehended by human logic.

This is a story to be believed and shared with others.

It's the good news the women heard:

"Why do you seek the living among the dead? He is not here, but has risen" (Luke 24:5-6).

We don't look for Christ among the dead for we know He is living!

Many around us are looking.

They read self-help books and follow the advice of the newest guru on TV.

They start reading "spiritual" books.

They're looking for the Living among the dead.

The angel brought God's Word to the women; it is our privilege to bring His Word to those around us who are looking.

There is nothing DEAD about our JESUS! He is Risen!

"The sting of death is sin, and the power of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, Who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:56).





ESWATINI (SWAZILAND)







Our Redeemer Lutheran Church Mission Committee

Highlighting the Christian/humanitarian work of our congregation as a whole and as individuals here and around the world.

Anita Nicholson continues to have strong ties to Eswatini (formerly known as Swaziland), which is a small country located in Southern Africa, where two-thirds of the population live in rural areas and face extreme poverty and many health challenges. Eswatini is led by King Mswati III, one of the few remaining absolute Monarchies. If you want to learn more about the country, read: The Culture of Swaziland.

Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Anita led a study abroad program to Eswatini with University of Iowa nursing students, traveling twice a year. She continues to teach a non-travel Global Health course, in which she and her students keep in close contact with Eswatini colleagues.

The Eswatini nurses continue to play an important role in providing health care to people in rural areas that otherwise would not have access to care. Faith Community nurses provide holistic and spiritual nursing care. Good Shepherd Hospital nurses work with outreach programs - home-based care and community outreach clinics to provide physical, emotional, and spiritual care. In 2020, when COVID-19 first arrived in Eswatini, the nurses were leaders to help prevent the spread by educating people to wear masks, wash hands, and social distance. They recruited volunteers to make masks and created innovative ways to wash hands in the rural setting without running water. The nurses also continue to advocate for HIV/AIDS prevention strategies as well as encourage HIV testing and treatment.

The COVID pandemic worsened the economics of the country with gas, food, and supply shortages. Then, in June 2021, Eswatini's social unrest escalated with people protesting for democratic reform. King Mswati III directed his military security forces to disband protestors. Our Eswatini colleagues shared that the unrest is currently quelled.

Anita hopes to return to Eswatini with nursing students in March of 2023. She continues to raise money to financially support health care initiatives in Eswatini.

A Steady Reminder of God's Presence

A Stephen Ministry Story

Mark and I had been married 26 years. Our sons were 18 and 20. We love being parents, but with our younger son graduating high school, we were eagerly anticipating the empty nest and having more time for each other.

In the fall, when our younger son started college, Mark began having stomach issues and back pain, which would linger for a few days and then disappear, only to reappear later. He also developed a cough. When his doctor ordered an MRI, the results were devastating - Stage IV pancreatic cancer, already in his liver and both lungs. Mark was only 53.

Our lives were turned upside down. I suddenly found myself trying to provide emotional support to Mark and our sons during the worst experience any of us had ever endured. I wanted and needed to keep myself together to focus on caring for Mark, but I was emotionally drained—full of sadness and terrified of what the future held. I had always been a "take responsibility for everything myself" kind of person. However, I knew I couldn't do this alone.

I talked to my pastor about it, and she suggested matching me with a Stephen Minister. I agreed, and less than two weeks after Mark was diagnosed, my Stephen Minister came for the first of her weekly visits.

It's difficulty to convey how important this Stephen Ministry relationship was for me. Our pastor was wonderful, and we had an amazing amount of support from many other people, but this time I spent with my Stephen Minister was the only time in the week when I could truly focus on my own needs. *She was there just for me.*

My Stephen Minister let me know that, while she was very concerned for Mark, her role was to be *my* support—to listen and help me process what I was feeling and going through, without giving advice or telling me what to do. The consistency of our Stephen Ministry relationship was crucial in helping me cope. Her weekly visits became an anchor in my life—something I could rely on when everything else was so uncertain. She was a steady reminder of God's presence, helping me know *I was never alone*.

Although Mark and I chose to talk publicly about his condition, my Stephen Ministry relationship was completely confidential. I knew I could share anything with her, and that's where it would stay.

Mark's illness progressed rapidly—ten weeks of treatment, followed by six weeks of hospice, and then his passing. My needs changed as I went from being wife to being caregiver to being a grieving widow and dealing with everything that the loss of a spouse entails. Through it all, my Stephen Minister's love and support continued. She was there for me at every stage of my journey. It was never easy, but my Stephen Minister helped me through the most difficult moments of my life.

I really can't say enough about how much I appreciate my church's Stephen Ministry. The compassionate, consistent, and confidential support of my Stephen Minister was so important in helping me cope—and then begin to heal.

God knows that after hours of watching and praying on the sidewalk, it is difficult, it is necessary, to stay strong and to reach out to people with a love-filled warning that God has a better plan for their life and the life of their child. Help me, God, to be a concerned, loving watchman that speaks the Good News Gospel on the sidewalk.







A Few More Classes

Thanks to full schedules the first few years of seminary, Don's final semester is nearly all electives. Here's what he's studying.

HISTORICAL



Pastors simply cannot proclaim the future of the church if they are ignorant of its past. This is true both at the congregational level, and at every level above it. Historical courses teach

where the church has been, so we can know where it is going.

Global Lutheranism (HIS-551)

Did you know that the largest
Lutheran church body in the world
is in Africa? That means the
average practicing Lutheran ain't
eating lutefisk in Ann Arbor, but
legume stew in Addis Ababa! This
seven-week course explores the
world's Lutheran churches and their
contributions to theology.

Demonology (HIS-599) Given the nature of the topic, this course is an independent study with Dr. Joel Elowsky by special approval from the Registrar's Office and the Provost. It is an historical survey of Christian approaches to spiritual warfare, including prayer, fasting and exorcism, especially by the early Desert Fathers, and tracking through the modern day.

SYSTEMATICS



Systematics is the study of the Christian framework (or system) for understanding the world. Classes include significant reading, lecture, and writing

Civil Affairs (SYS-522) This class looked at the relationship between Church and State from various perspectives, and how Christians
—especially in America— might
remain faithful to God in both the
civil and churchly realms. After all,
God rules all things... including
both Church and State!

PRACTICAL

The Practical courses are exactly what they sound like: practical. They equip future

pastors with tools to serve the people around them, such as: how to counsel and give "mental health first aid," how to train up leaders, balance a budget, manage a classroom and Don's favorite—preach!



Formation Lab (PRA-342) This course is more conversation than class. Led by a faculty advisor, students are broken up into five-person "Winkels" (the German word for "corner") where they discuss daily life and spirituality. One part support group, another part mentorship, all parts Christian brotherhood, it's an important piece of pastoral formation.

Pastoral Leadership & Theology This semester-long (PRA-517) course explores the day-to-day aspects of pastoral care for a whole congregation, and the theological rationale in involved in that care. It is front-loaded with lots of reading and reports, but after Call Day, the focus of the course shifts to preparing for a pastor's specific congregation. A new pastor-elect familiarizes himself with congregation through his assigned Call Documents.

Christianity & Literature (PRA-562) This course looked at how good Christian literature —and art in general— is not necessarily overtly religious, but points to grace in more subtle ways. The Collected Words of Flannery O'Connor served as the primary textbook.

EXEGETICAL

Exegetical courses consist of 'readings' in a specific portion of the Scriptures. Students




translate large sections of Greek or Hebrew text, and write papers outlining various interpretations of difficult passages in order to apply them to life.

Hebrew & Greek Labs (EXH-341) These simple pass/fail courses are not for credit, but nonetheless required. They exist to keep language skills sharp.

Wisdom Literature (EXE-535) This seven-week course explores those "fortune cookie" nuggets of wisdom from poetic books like Job, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes and Song of Songs. In addition to writing papers, translating and taking quizzes, there is also a devotional component. Students are required to read the book of Ecclesiastes in their daily devotions.

Revelation (EXE-528) This sevenweek course studied one of the most misunderstood books in all of Scripture. Instead of doom and gloom about the end of all things, Revelation actually points to a beautiful promise of restoration fulfilled in Jesus Christ.

Training at Retreat

Our Africa team spring training retreat was in Egypt this year, on the desolate shore of the Red Sea. Unlike the Israelites, we did not retreat into the sea, although some did splash in it a bit. This is a time for those who work together here and their families

to see each other in person.

Our presenter was Dwight Shettler from Ambassadors of Reconciliation, an LCMS service organization which helps people and congregations with

Preparing Interns

As part of his role as Field Education Officer, Vance held an orientation meeting for those who will be going on internship at the end of this semester. There are thirty of them this time. The evangelist and deaconess students do a three month internship and the pastoral students do six months. They will do three this summer, return for a year of classes and do three next summer. Vance will assign faculty members to visit each one.

The students go back to their home churches for the internships.

This time they are from eight different countries and nine different church bodies.

In May, the current interns will return to campus for "debriefing" about their experiences. The pastoral students among them finish some classes during a summer quarter. Then this group will graduate in September along with those in the new group

who will finish their internship

by that time.

Please pray for us, praising God for sending workers into his fields, thanking Him for the students who are finishing their studies, and asking Him to give these students all the material and spiritual blessings they need for their work.

The End is Near

Time is flying and the semester is already half over. Students have taken midterm tests known as CATs (Continuing Assessment Tests) and now Vance is busy preparing final



exams. They have to be "moderated" and approved by the rest of the faculty before they are given.

Vance has learned his teaching assignments for next semester, so he will need to begin preparing for them as soon has he has time. He will be teaching Homiletics (preaching) I and II again. He is teaching three new classes. One is Worship, one is Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke) and the other is Catechism. That is something he has taught many times before.

Please pray for us, praising God for all the truths he has given us to share, thanking Him for what the students have learned so far, and asking Him to help both Vance and the students be well prepared and effective.

Bible reflection

My devotion for our team retreat in Egypt was based on the story of Jesus' "flight to Egypt" as a baby, one of the few times in the Bible that people were actually told to go there.

Other times that people went to Egypt were because of fear, such as Abraham and Jacob who both went because of fear of famine and those who went because of fear of some enemy. Also because of their fears, they did wrong things hurting others.

Others in the Old Testament, such as Joseph and Jeremiah, were taken to Egypt because of the fears of other people that led them to do wrong. Maybe we can say that Egypt is a symbol of fear that leads to doing wrong to others. A common reaction to fear is fight or flight.

Jesus also went to Egypt because of the fear of another, Herod. But the reason Jesus went everywhere he did was to be with us, including when we are in a state of fear or being hurt because of the fears of others. It is because Jesus is with us in all things that we do not need to fight or flee but can have peace and respond to others with peace and peacemaking.

Please pray for us, being with us in every time and place, thanking Him for Jesus' suffering for and with us and asking Him to free us from all fear and fill us with his peace.

Culture Contrasts

Even when we are both speaking English, it is often difficult to understand others here. One reason is that a way of showing respect is speaking softly. Some students, especially the women, are so respectful, you can't hear them at all!

But even when heard clearly, the English here can be misunderstood because of words that are used differently. We already knew that in British English, which is the pattern here, a car's hood is a "bonnet" and the trunk is a "boot."

When a student says they are "revising" their class notes, they don't mean they are changing them but what we would call "reviewing." A meeting to "moderate" something is not about toning it down but simply agreeing on changes. If a student is "outside" it does not just mean out of doors but off campus. If a sick student says they are feeling better "somehow" it doesn't mean they don't know why but "somewhat" better. The list goes on.

People wonder...

Was it really hot in Egypt?

When we returned from our retreat in Egypt and people here asked how it was, we mentioned that it was amazingly barren, just sand and rocks, if you get away from the Nile which is used for irrigation.

So, picturing the desert, people asked if it was really hot. Actually, we were surprised how cold it was. We had looked at the weather and knew that since it is a ways north of the equator, about even with Florida, it would be cooler than here this time of year. But, maybe because of the low humidity, it was colder than we expected. Vance ended up doing his Minnesota thing, wearing two pair of

pants and several shirts on top of each other along with our jackets.

Spring Confirmation Retreat April 22-24

The 8th grade Confirmation students have been preparing for the **Spiritual Growth Event** which will be held on Wednesday, April 27th.

Preparation for the Spiritual Growth Event is more than just studying for **questioning**.

Confirmation Verse — Each student chooses a Bible verse to be his/her Confirmation verse.

Paper — Once the students have chosen their verse, then they write a short paper about it. They write about where their verse is found in the Bible, who wrote that book of the Bible and an explanation of why they chose their verse. During the Spiritual Growth Event, each student reads their paper aloud to the congregation.

Banner — Each 8th grade Confirmand also creates a banner with their Confirmation verse on it. The style and themes of the banners are unique and usually reflect the interests of the student. The banners are displayed on the back walls of the Sanctuary beginning on the night of the Spiritual Growth Event.



Reception — The evening ends with a reception in the Fellowship Hall where the Our Redeemer family celebrates with the Confirmands. During the reception, the High School Youth present handmade, personalized cards to each of the Confirmands along with a special gift. The high school students also give a short talk encouraging the 8th graders to remain active at church after they've been confirmed.

The 8th graders will be confirmed on CONFIRMATION SUNDAY which will be on Sunday, May 1st.


