An elder must be dedicated to God's Word and live as an example to other members. The Board of Elders consists of men elected at the September Voters' Meeting for three-year terms. The terms are staggered; thus, new elders are added regularly. Generally, each elder serves two terms, but the second is strictly voluntary.

Elders assist with worship services in such ways as Holy Communion, Scripture reading, special prayers, and Baptism.

Each elder is assigned a zone consisting of 60-80 member families. Zones are determined alphabetically by last name.

Each elder is responsible as a prayer partner with another committee chair and concerns himself with the spiritual welfare of the person and committee involved.

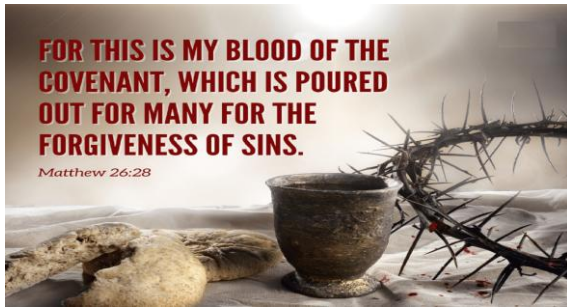
Regular elder meetings are scheduled at 7:00 pm on the first Thursday of each month.

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BODY OF CHRIST

This theme serves two purposes for the people of Our Redeemer. This theme will focus on a threefold definition of the body of Christ – **Christ**, **Communion**, **Church**. Through worship and teaching, the congregation will receive instruction on the body of Christ being Jesus himself, the Lord's Supper, and the whole church of God. The congregation will be able to explain the differences between these three definitions. Consequently, through an increased focus on communion, in teaching and experience, the congregation will grow in deeper appreciation for the Lord's Supper. This will take place through teaching about the sacrament and what it does for us. Communion will be offered more frequently. Communion will be served at Wednesday services in Advent and in Lent. Communion will also be served every Sunday in Lent. Common cup will be offered at Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday services to book end the season of Lent.

Threefold definition of the Body of Christ:
Christ, **Communion**, **Church**

The body of Christ is truly his **body**, meaning it is Jesus himself. Jesus Christ, the son of God who came down from heaven to dwell among his people--to heal and cast out demons; to preach the Gospel, the coming of the kingdom of God; to take our sins to the cross and die for the sin of the world, descending into hell and rising on the third day to defeat sin, death, and the devil. Jesus continues to speak today, through Scripture, the Sacraments, and the preaching of His Word.

The body of Christ is given to us in the **Lord's Supper**. He gives himself to us as a living sacrifice for the forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation. The eating of Christ's body does these things to us by the power of the Word. In faith, we understand this is bread is also truly his body because Jesus has told us it is.

The body of Christ is the **whole church of Christ** on earth, visible and invisible. The gathering of the people of God in worship and fellowship, the church buildings, and the institutions of the church (colleges, seminaries, Lutheran family service, LCEF, etc.) make up the visible church here on earth. Through the visible church God distributes His gifts and promises through His Word and Sacraments. God works through his people as individual parts of His body. Each member makes the whole body of Christ. The invisible church is all believers in Christ. We cannot know the hearts of the people around us. We cannot measure faith. The invisible church is known only to God.

THEME VERSES

John 1:14 And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen his glory, glory as of the only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth.

John 20:31 but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he gave it to them, and they all drank of it. And he said to them, "This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many. Truly, I say to you, I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until that day when I drink it new in the kingdom of God." And when they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives.

Luke 22:17-23 And he took a cup, and when he had given thanks he said, "Take this, and divide it among yourselves. For I tell you that from now on I will not drink of the fruit

of the vine until the kingdom of God comes." And he took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which is given for you. Do this in remembrance of me." And likewise the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup that is poured out for you is the new covenant in my blood. But behold, the hand of him who betrays me is with me on the table. For the Son of Man goes as it has been determined, but woe to that man by whom he is betrayed!" And they began to question one another, which of them it could be who was going to do this.

1 Corinthians 11:23-26 For I received from the Lord what I also delivered to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body, which is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In the same way also he took the cup, after supper, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

1 Corinthians 12: 26-31 If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together. Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then miracles, then gifts of healing, helping, administrating, and various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak with tongues? Do all interpret? But earnestly desire the higher gifts. And I will show you a still more excellent way. (Full passage verses 12-31)

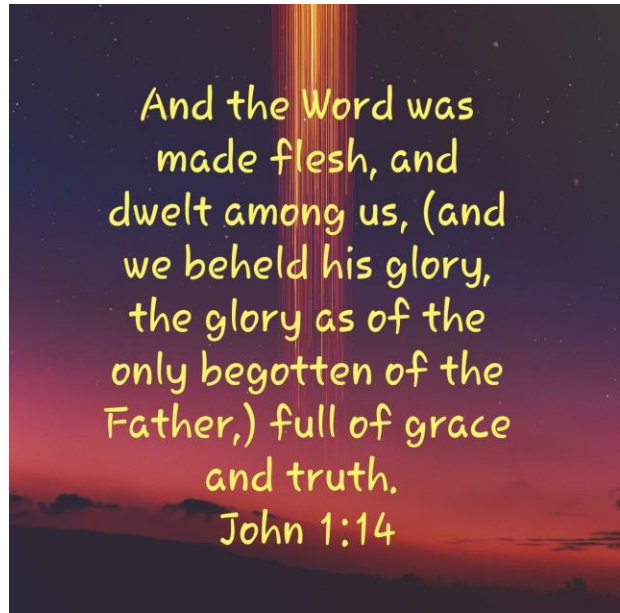
THEME HYMN

Stephen Ministry

Our Redeemer Lutheran Church is served by several Stephen Ministers.

Their vision statement is **The Our Redeemer Stephen Ministry prepares and supports laity who provide Christ-centered care to people facing a variety of crises or who are life-challenged.** A crisis, used in this context, is defined as an emotionally charged time or instability during which a crucial life change occurred; that is, a situation or period in which things are uncertain, difficult, or painful, especially a time when action must be taken to avoid a breakdown or life spinning out of control. It is not an indication of futility, but a time of imbalance, where the trusting relationship between the affected person and God is strained by preoccupation with worldly concerns.

Stephen Ministry can help the person in crisis by establishing a safe haven based upon the love of Christ and the compassion of an empathetic and understanding Christian willing to help the affected work through his/her imbalance through active listening and thoughtful sharing of life experiences, allowing the person to again feel the healing power of Christ's love within his/her life.

Implicit in this arrangement is a process-oriented relationship, not an outcome-based arrangement. Confidentiality is implicit in all Stephen Ministry relationships.

511 MELROSE OPEN HOUSE

Hot dogs served in the parking lot and tours of the house will acquaint Our Redeemer members with the ministry LLL has supported since 1973, providing Alcoholics Anonymous groups with a meeting place.

In 1972, members of Our Redeemer voted to buy the property at 511 Melrose in Iowa City from Iowa District East. The district had originally purchased the property as a parsonage for St. Paul's, and then allowed a local AA group that moved from Our Redeemer to use the site. When the district decided to sell, Our Redeemer committed to purchase the property for \$25,000 in 1972, paying off the mortgage in 1986. Improvements are continually made such as a new roof, permanent siding, new windows, remodeling of the interior rooms to accommodate more people, and adding a handicap entrance. A fire escape and necessary emergency lighting were done in 1995. The hot water heating system was replaced in 1996 by volunteers from Our Redeemer. The house provides the site for important social ministry meetings for alcohol and drug recovery. The property is maintained through LLL's fall football parking.

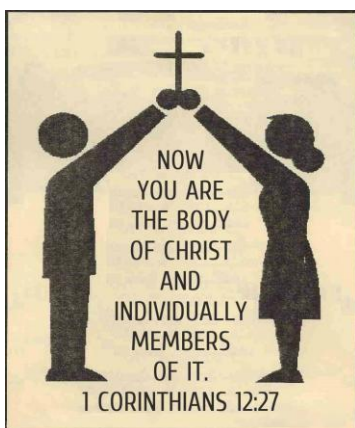

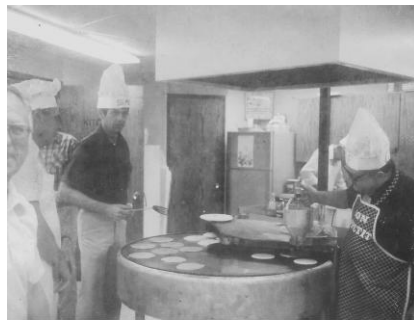


PANCAKE DAY

What is Trivia Challenge?

Trivia Challenges are informal, fun competitions where teams battle to see who has the greatest knowledge of trivia.

General knowledge and trivial interest questions are asked by a trivia host and the winner is the team which, at the end of the event, has correctly answered the most number of questions.

How does Trivia Challenge work?

The events themselves are quite simple. You gather a group of eight participants to form a team.

The Challenge is run in rounds. During each round the host asks a series of ten questions. The teams discuss the answers at their table and record their answers on their score sheet.

At the conclusion of each round, the sheets are collected and checked for accuracy. Meanwhile, the answers are revealed to the participants.

At the conclusion of the seven rounds, total scores are added up and a traveling trophy is awarded to the winning team.

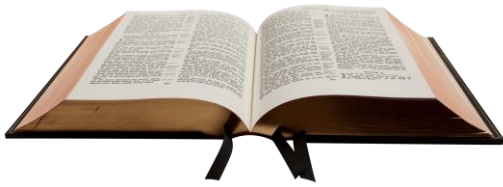
What is Trunk-or-Treat? It's when congregational members get together at church, park their cars in the parking lot, open up the trunks of their cars, and kids come to each car for goodies!

IMPORTANCE OF BIBLE STUDY



Bible study strengthens faith, provides guidance, protects against false teachings, and deepens understanding of God's Word.

Spiritual Growth and Guidance

Studying the Bible helps believers grow spiritually by providing direction in life and clarifying God's will. It serves as a lamp to guide decisions, offering wisdom and insight for daily living (Psalm 119:105) and helping believers pray according to God's will (1 John 5:14). It also nourishes the soul, allowing individuals to mature in faith and develop a deeper relationship with God.¹

Protection Against False Teachings

Bible study equips believers to recognize and resist false teachings. By understanding Scripture thoroughly, one can discern truth from error and avoid being misled by doctrines that distort God's Word (2 Timothy 2:16-18; Jude 1:4). This ensures that faith remains grounded in the truth of Christ and prevents spiritual deception.²

Understanding God and Salvation

Through Bible study, believers gain a fuller appreciation of God's character, His love, and the salvation offered through Jesus Christ (John 3:16; Romans 5:8). It clarifies how one attains eternal life and helps believers understand the principles of righteousness, repentance, and grace.³

Rightly Handling Scripture

Studying the Bible teaches proper interpretation and application of Scripture. It helps prevent misinterpretation or "wrongly dividing the Word" (2 Timothy 2:15) and allows the Holy Spirit to guide understanding (John 16:13).² This ensures that teachings and personal beliefs align with God's intended message.

Practical and Cultural Benefits

Beyond spiritual growth, Bible study enhances cultural literacy. Many phrases, ethical principles, and historical references in art, literature, and law originate from the Bible, making it a key resource for understanding Western culture and moral foundations. It also provides wisdom for handling life's challenges, strengthens resistance to temptation, and equips believers for service and spiritual warfare.¹

Summary

Engaging in Bible study is valuable for spiritual development, protection against false teachings, understanding God's Word, and gaining practical wisdom. It nurtures faith, provides guidance, and equips believers to live a life aligned with God's purposes while deepening knowledge of Scripture and its relevance in both personal and cultural contexts.²

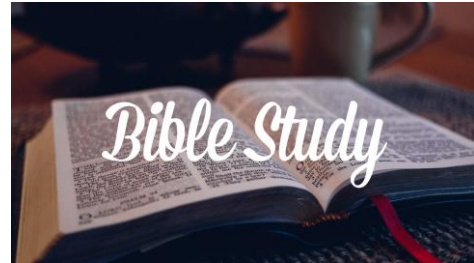

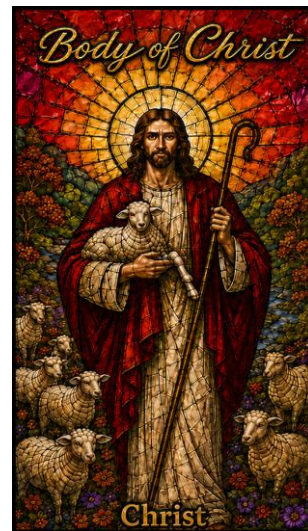

“The Word became flesh and tabernacled among us” (John 1:14). The Second Person of the Holy Trinity experienced every stage of human life. He was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the blessed virgin Mary, grew in wisdom and stature before the Lord. He was tempted in every way that we are, taught as One with authority, performed miracles. He bore our sins on a tree, rose victoriously from the grave, and promises to return to earth in the same way He departed.

Central to the Body of Christ, is our Lord Jesus Himself. He took on human form, and lives and reigns over heaven and earth in His Body to this day. As Christians, we are intimately known by our Lord, and we strive to know Him more and more until we meet Him, face to face.



In this Bible study, you will get to know your Lord deeper by exploring Christ's life, from the Nativity to His promised second coming. We investigate the mystery of Christ's person by looking at several snapshots during key turning points in His life and ministry by using: (1) the "Life of Christ" mural found in the fellowship hall and (2) learning chronological phases of Christ's life that theologians and scholars refer to as "The Mysteries of Christ" or "Gospel Harmony Phases."

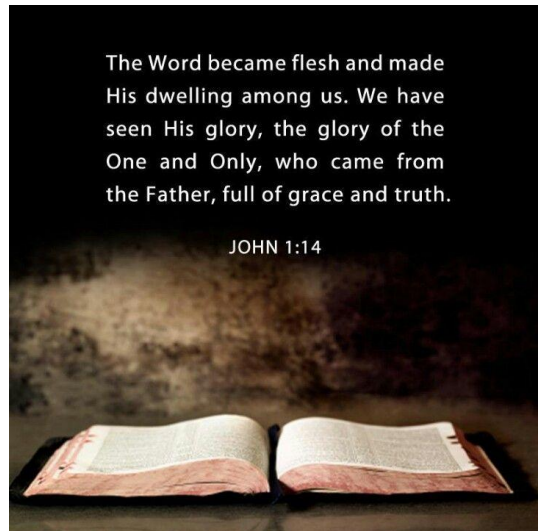

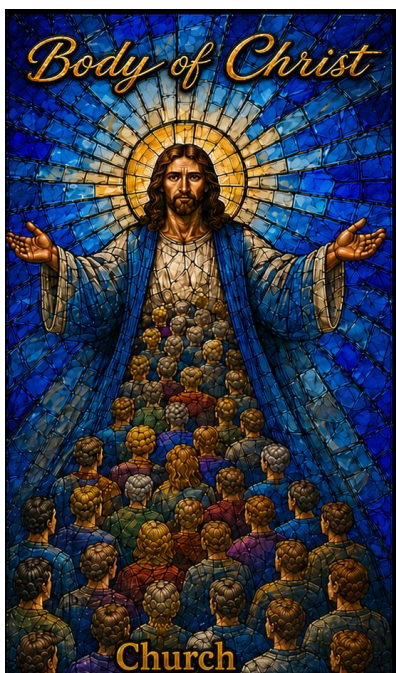

“The body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body” (1 Cor. 12:12). A common metaphor for the Christian church is “the body of Christ.” The body cannot exist without our Lord Jesus Christ as the head. We confess that all who are under the Headship of Jesus are Christians. However, you don’t have to look very hard to see that different Christian bodies confess different things about what the Head has said. So, the question remains: “Is Christ divided?” (1 Cor. 1:12).

It's easy to think all Christians believe the same thing. But this tension must be maintained: Jesus’ desire “that all would be one just as we are one” (John 17:22); and staying faithful to the “Words that you gave me” (John 17:8).

It can be overwhelming to sort out what each Christian body believes and why. Doctrines like Baptism, Communion, and

free will are not mute points of theological jargon for scholars. Topics like these divide the Body of Christ, and it is important to know why.

In *Body of Christ: Church*, the teachings of the LCMS and other Christian traditions are examined and compared. Students develop a deeper understanding of the similarities and differences that exist and are equipped to defend the truth.

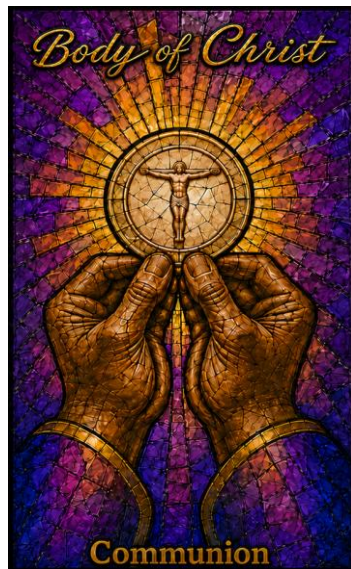

BODY OF CHRIST: COMMUNION

As faithful Lutherans, we know that Jesus is truly present “in, with, and under” the forms of bread and wine in the Eucharist. This is most certainly true. However, the Bible presents a framework that is much richer than these three prepositions.

From the beginning of time, God has desired to have full and intimate union with His people. And throughout history, God has graciously given this encounter to the Body of Believers in a multitude of ways – uniting them to Himself and granting them forgiveness of sins, life, and salvation.

As modern Christians, it is important to recognize the continuity between how God’s people received union with Him in the past and how our Lord communes with us today.

In *Communing with Christ*, we explore how the Lord’s Supper is not merely another

way that God distributes forgiveness. But that our Lord Jesus is present in the Sacramental Meal for the express purpose of uniting us to Himself and all believers throughout time.

SMALL GROUP MINISTRY



Mission Statement

*To grow in grace,
using our spiritual gifts,
through good stewardship
for the benefit of the group
so that the body of Christ may be built up.*

Like nothing else, Small Groups have the power to change lives. They are the ideal route to discipleship – a place where the rubber of biblical truth meets the road of human relationships.

Small Groups are intentionally formed “communities of care” of 4-12 people who share a common interest and meet regularly in their homes for Scripture, prayer, and service, with concern and support for one another.

Small Group Ministry (SGM) has been active in Our Redeemer in some shape or form for many years. Small Groups emulate the following five characteristics:

CARING

A small group provides an environment by which members in the group are cared for and nurtured by one another. This includes prayer support, phone calls, encouragement, and resources that will help meet the group members’ care needs.

SHARING

A small group provides a friendly and supportive atmosphere where members can safely share joys and concerns, knowing that what is said will be treated with sensitivity and will be kept in confidence.

PRAYING

A small group supports each other by praying with one another and for one another as a key part of the growth of relationships.

GROWING

A small group nurtures spiritual growth through time spent together in the Word, contributing to the growth and maturity of each group member.

SERVING

A small group selects service activities that benefit the church and the community. This strengthens group relationships while reaching out to others in need.

We currently have several small groups meeting at Our Redeemer.

COMFORT-TIERS

This is a group of women who meet in the Fellowship Hall and tie comforters for Lutheran World Relief (LWR) and other charities.

The group meets on Thursdays from 9:00 am until noon. Anyone is welcome to come and help tie for an hour or two. The tables are elevated to prevent stress to the back. Coffee/goodies are shared, along with a devotion. We sometimes go out to eat together.

If you wish to donate toward the making of these comforters, we accept any type of fabrics that are washable and clean:

- Good used sheets, light blankets, draperies, curtains, tablecloths, pillowcases, linens; even any of these torn, mended, or stained can be used as 'middles'--a third layer helps sift out sand during sandstorms in desert areas.
- Sewing scraps of any size to patch together to make top layers.
- Heavy crochet thread (Number 10) to tie with; any other yarns donated are used in crocheting/knitting caps, scarves or mittens for school children and caps for UI Hospital babies.
- We do not use quilting thread but do use any color sewing thread--any leftover or new spools.
- Used 100% cotton T-shirts are cut up and sewn into diapers for LWR baby care kits.

Monetary donations are always welcome. Make checks payable to Our Redeemer Women's Mission Guild and enter Comfort-Tiers on the Memo line.

You can give the check to any active LWML Guild member. We shop at thrift stores, store sales, and garage sales to make the funds go further or you might like to shop yourself.

LUTHERAN LAYMEN’S LEAGUE (LLL)

In 1917, a group of 12 men attending a convention of The Lutheran Church--Missouri Synod in Milwaukee met to settle a \$100,000 debt incurred by the church body. They accomplished that goal, and in the process formed the Lutheran Laymen's League (LLL). The LLL next raised more than \$2.7 million to fund a pension plan for professional church workers.

Our Redeemer LLL members meet during the months of January, March, May, and October on the fourth Tuesday at 6:30 pm for business, special programs, and fellowship. The LLL Steak Cookout happens yearly on the fourth Tuesday of August at 6:00 pm. This cookout is at Our Redeemer. Men bring their own meat and a dish to share. The coals on a hot grill will be ready.

One important outreach ministry LLL supports is 511 Melrose, the meeting place for Iowa City Alcoholics Anonymous groups. Purchased from the Synod August 29, 1973, by Our Redeemer Lutheran Church, payments were made for 13 years through contributions by church members and the annual “Pancake Day” benefit. The mortgage was paid off in June 1986. The property is maintained through LLL’s fall football parking.

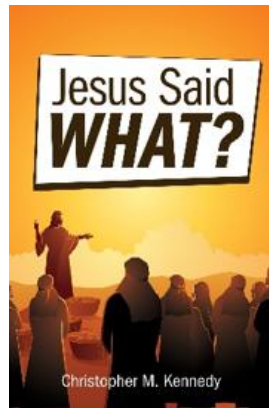

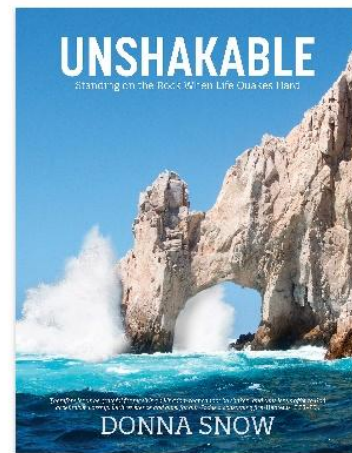
Jesus doesn't always tell you what you want to hear. But He always tells you what you need to hear, and even the hard words are a gift given to you in love.

In *Jesus Said WHAT?*, author Christopher Kennedy tackles some of Jesus' words that people may struggle to understand. It may seem easier to avoid some of Jesus' tough sayings, but instead of shying away from these passages, Kennedy urges readers to look to Scripture to understand Scripture.

As the Ten Commandments are connected with the words of Jesus, Kennedy demonstrates the Law, but reminds Christians to stay firmly focused on the forgiveness and grace that comes through the Gospel of Jesus Christ. 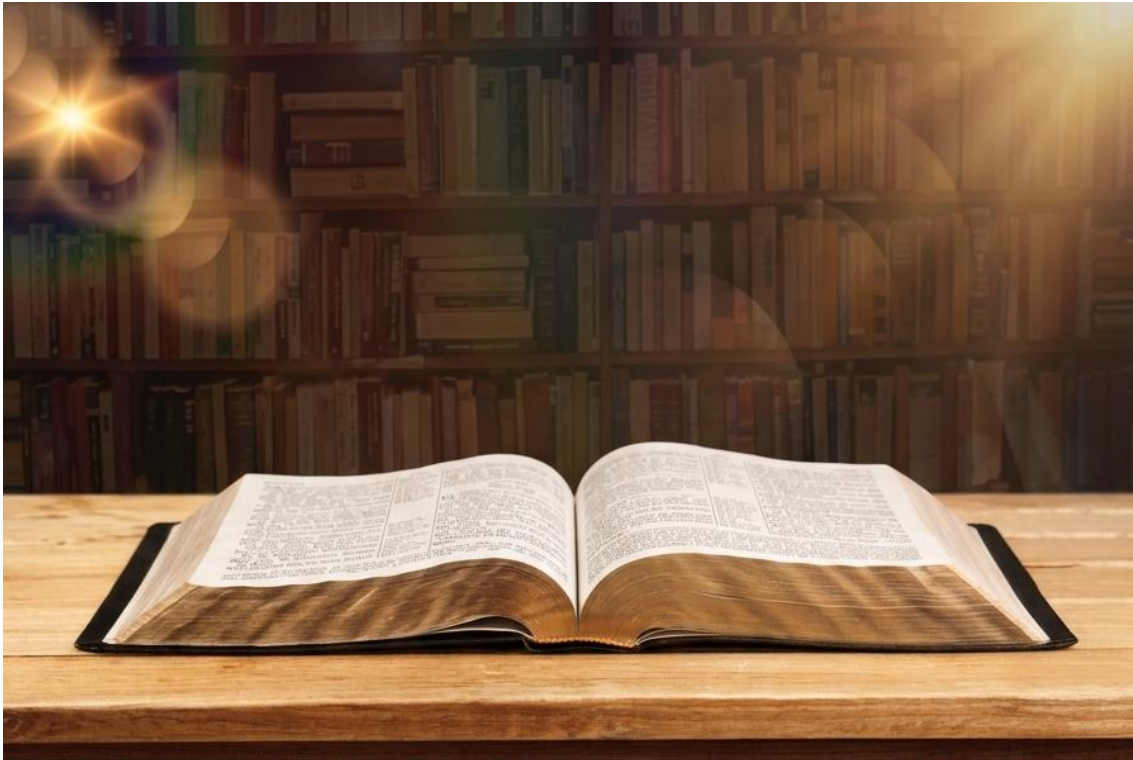

Women's Mission Guild (LWML)



MISSION

The mission of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League is to assist each woman of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod in affirming her relationship with the Triune God so that she is enabled to use her gifts in ministry to the people of the world.

Our Redeemer's Women's Mission Guild is a part of the International Lutheran Women's Missionary League, known as LWML. Since 1942, the LWML has focused on affirming each woman's relationship with Christ, encouraging and equipping women to live out their Christian lives in active mission ministries and to support global missions.

OUR PURPOSE is...

OUR GOAL is to involve all women of Our Redeemer, each affirming her relationship with God so she is enabled to use her gifts in serving the Lord with gladness. We like to refer to ourselves as Lutheran Women in Mission.

MEETINGS

Our Lutheran Women's Missionary League or Mission Guild typically meets the third Monday of most months in the Fellowship Hall. See schedule for times and exceptions. At most of the meetings, we have devotions, Bible study, a speaker or mission project, and a snack. Collections for mites and for general offering are taken.

LWML SPECIAL COMMITTEES

Within LWML are many small groups that serve our congregation in the mission to further the Word. These sometimes are ordinary things. You can send a faith-based greeting card from our Card Shop or assist the church library ladies in processing new items.

We have a faithful group of women that help serve at funeral lunches or other serving events.

One of our most productive groups is the Comfort-Tiers. This dedicated bunch of stitchers provides World Relief or local charities with more comfort quilts than you could imagine. World Relief efforts are a big part of our mission here. We have two large donations every year.

SUPPORTING MISSIONS

Through our two major annual **fun**-draisers, the Cookie Walk in December and the Tasting Bee in the spring, we provide funds to several local, national, and international mission projects. Our Redeemer campers at Camp Io-Dis-E-Ca are eligible for one-third of the cost, up to \$60. Grants to women serving Jesus Christ and supporting the LWML through the LCMS or its recognized service organizations are available, grants starting at \$100. CHRISTMAS COOKIE WALK

December 5, 2026

On the first Saturday of December the LWML hosts a Cookie Walk. Dozens upon dozens of cookies, every kind you can think of, cover over 80 feet of table space. These cookies are sold by the pound. If you think the line-up of cookies is long, you should see the line-up of customers at the door. Each year, many people come for these wonderful homemade treats.

Congregational help is needed:

1. Pray that the attendees might see Christ's light in this mission-centered activity while they are shopping.
2. Pull out your favorite recipes and prepare to bake. We encourage each family to bake four or more dozen cookies. If you like a challenge, bake one more dozen than you did last year.
3. Help advertise by placing posters at your workplace and/or local shops.
4. Prayerfully consider giving of your time to assist with set-up, greeting our guests, or cleaning up the crumbs left behind.



MITE BOX

What is a "Mite Box"? Recall the biblical account of the poor widow who gave two very small copper coins, worth only a fraction of a penny. Calling His disciples to Him, Jesus said, *"I tell you the truth, this poor widow has put more into the treasury than all the others. They all gave out of their wealth; but she, out of her poverty, put in everything—all she had to live on."*

~ Mark 12:43

These are the pennies, nickels, dimes, and quarters saved from day to day. Mite boxes have changed in color and design over the years, but what has never changed is the dedication of freely-given offerings for the purpose of reaching out to others with the Good News of Jesus Christ. 75% of these monies go to the LWML District East for its biennial mission projects; the other 25% goes to the national organization for its biennial mission projects.

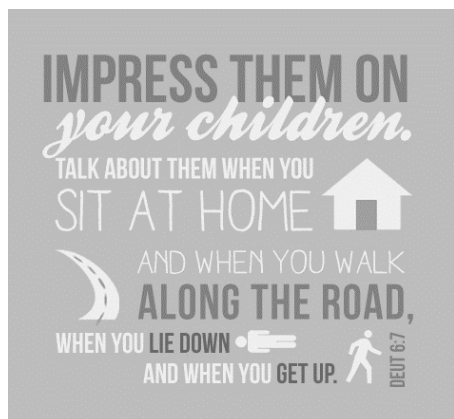
Mission Statement

As part of Our Redeemer's dedication to equip our youth as disciples of Jesus and prepare them for full communing

membership in the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS), Confirmation classes are held for 6th, 7th, and 8th graders.

These classes provide young people the opportunity to understand and grow in the teachings of Holy Scripture, thus building on the foundation given them in their Holy Baptism, preparing them for the Rite of Confirmation, which is held during the spring for the 8th grade confirmands.

- Meet **Wednesday** nights during the school year from **6:45 pm – 8:00 pm**.
- Alternate between *Lecture* and *Small Group*:
 - **Lecture nights:** Pastor instructs the 6th or 8th graders, and Vicar teaches the 7th graders.
 - **Small Group nights:** Girls and boys are split into separate groups by grade and are led by a small group leader.

CONFIRMATION RETREATS



Students are expected to attend three retreats held during the school year. Since lessons are taught during these retreats, it is important for students to participate. The youth really enjoy their time spent at the retreats. There are fees for some of the retreats, but full scholarships are available. Adult chaperones are free.

FALL

We host a 6th grade fall retreat and a separate 7th and 8th grade fall retreat. These retreats are held at church. A highlight for the 6th graders is making creation pizza with Pastor. The 7th and 8th graders enjoy the evening worship service, getting to sleep overnight at church and playing games. There is no cost for the fall retreats.

WINTER

This retreat is for all Confirmation students (6th, 7th, and 8th graders) and their parents. This overnight retreat is held at a local hotel on a Friday night and ends on Saturday morning. Since we usually cover two lessons during this retreat, it's important for everyone to attend. Plus, this is a fun event for parents to chaperone. The students' favorite fellowship activity is going swimming in the wintertime. There is a registration fee for students but they can use their church prize account funds or ask for a scholarship.

SPRING

This special retreat is for 6th, 7th, and 8th graders and their parents. It is a weekend, out-of-state retreat. We usually leave church early on a Saturday morning and return late Monday afternoon. For this trip, we take a charter bus to one of these cities: St. Louis, St. Paul, or Chicago. At each destination, we learn about one person of the Holy Trinity (St. Louis – God the Father; St. Paul – God the Son; and Chicago – God the Holy Spirit). There is a registration fee for students but they can use their church prize account funds or ask for a scholarship.

Successful completion of Confirmation instruction is an important milestone in a young person's spiritual life and is just one step of his/her faith journey here at Our Redeemer.

High School Midweek meets in the Youth Room from 6:45 pm until 8:00 pm on Wednesdays during the school year.

At Our Redeemer, Midweek is about more than just another activity— it's a place for students to **connect with friends, grow in faith, and enjoy being together.**

Wednesday nights provide a welcoming environment where high school students can step away from their busy schedules, build meaningful relationships, and grow together as Christians. High School Midweek is a safe place where youth can share their faith and ask questions about God.

Our gatherings include a variety of **fun, fellowship, service, conversation, and time in God's Word.** While each week may look a little different, the purpose remains the same: creating a strong Christian community where students are encouraged in their faith and equipped to follow Jesus in everyday life.

YOUTH WORSHIP

Once a year, the **Confirmation** and **High School Youth** get to help with all three services as part of **Youth Worship Weekend** at Our Redeemer. Our Redeemer is sometimes known as “the church with the real animals at Christmas,” because each December the High School youth host the Live Nativity.

The scene consists of Mary, Joseph, shepherds, Wise Men, and an angel portrayed by the high school students.

This event attracts many members of our community and is a great way to proclaim the birth of our Savior!

All high school youth are encouraged to participate in this community outreach event.

The Live Nativity will be on **Sunday, December 13th** from 4:00 pm - 6:00 pm.

SUMMER SERVANT EVENT – UKANDU



UKANDU is the summer servant event for high school youth at Our Redeemer. Participants can expect to serve alongside 150 other people from a variety of churches to bring the love of Jesus to the people of inner-city Chicago.

UKANDU is a Christian mission organization dedicated to helping youth and adults become the heart and hands of Christ to those in need around the world.

The philosophy comes from Scripture and is reflected in its name. *“I (You) CAN DO all things through Christ who strengthens me”* ~ Philippians 4:13 and *“For we are God’s workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do”* ~ Ephesians 2:10.

LCMS YOUTH GATHERING (LCMS YG)



The LCMS Youth Gathering (LCMS YG) is for high school students. Held every three years since 1980, the LCMS Youth Gathering provides thousands of youth and adults the opportunity to come together as a community of God’s people to be encouraged in their walk with Jesus Christ and learn about the Christian faith and their Lutheran identity.

This international event is organized by LCMS Youth Ministry in St. Louis. At Our Redeemer, we take a group of high school students, parent/adult chaperones, and Young Adult Volunteers (college-age adults who are official YAVs for the Gathering) on a 10-day trip to participate in the Gathering. During the five days at the Gathering, we spend time together in God’s Word, worship, service, and fellowship with 20,000+ other Lutherans from across the world.

The next **LCMS Youth Gathering** will be held in San Antonio, Texas from July 3—7, 2028. Exact dates of the trip will be announced when registration begins in September 2027.

FUNDRAISING and PRIZE ACCOUNTS



Confirmation and High School youth including their families host two annual fundraisers each year: the **Youth Colorado Peach Fundraiser** and the **Youth Pie Sale**.



Profits from the **Youth Peach Fundraiser** and **Youth Pie Sale** support the Confirmation and High School youth events and activities, including Confirmation Retreats, the LCMS Youth Gathering, and UKANDU.

The **Youth Peach Fundraiser** is the *primary fundraiser* for the youth and earns the largest amount of money to support the youth program. Many people in our community, as well as our congregation, look forward to our peach sale each summer. ALL youth families are expected to help sell peaches and volunteer on Peach Pickup Day in order to make this fundraiser successful.

The **Youth Pie Sale** is held each November. Youth families make 100+ homemade fruit pies in a four-hour morning work session to sell to our congregation. Each youth (6th – 12th grade) has the opportunity to earn money by helping with these fundraisers. Money earned will be added to each youth's church **Prize Account**.



Prize Account funds can be used as payment towards any Our Redeemer youth activity that requires money.

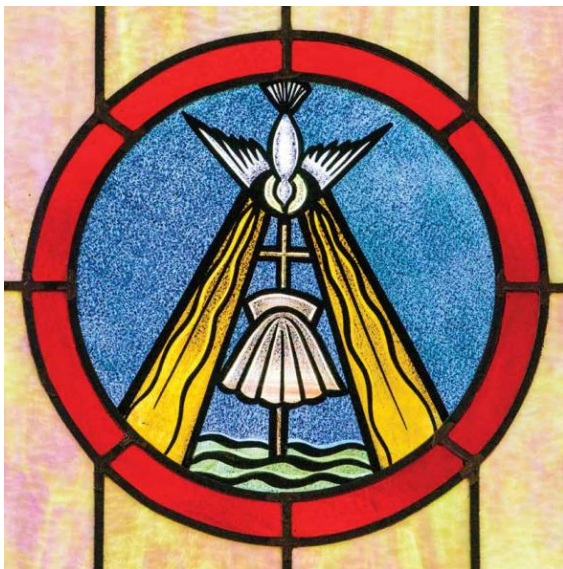
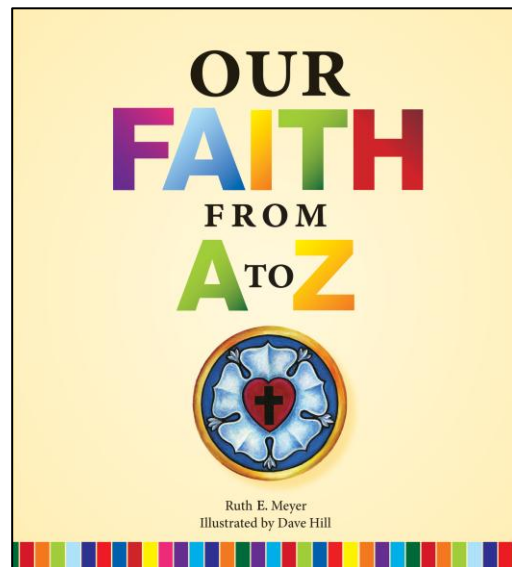


Mission Statement

- To promote learning through play, "One in Christ" Curriculum is used. Teachers engage students according to where they are developmentally and help them grow.

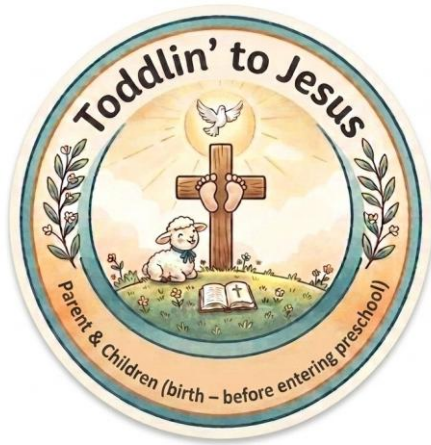

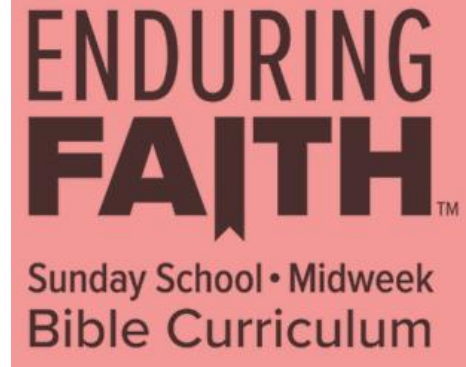
SUNDAY SCHOOL

MEMORY WORK

In building a strong foundation of faith for our children, we believe it is important to begin teaching some of the core components of the catechism and Bible memory verses at an early age. These are taught in the classroom lesson times.

What are the benefits of memory work?

- We use memory work for our everyday experiences.
- Certain facts must be memorized for quick recall and retrieval.
- Memory can become part of our life and this memorized information can be internalized and become part of a student's life patterns and belief system.
- Memory work can assist students to think more sharply and to utilize and apply information.



Benefits of memorizing Scripture passages, hymns, books of the Bible:

- When this is accomplished, we can look up/quote Scripture more easily.
- Selected Scripture and hymns can be recited to give strength and encouragement in times of distress and pain.
- Memorization reminds the students of their beliefs and provides strength to live accordingly.
- It has learning potential.

What is Our Redeemer's goal?

Memory selections:

1. Are carefully chosen on the basis of their meaning and value for living and sharing the Christian faith.
2. Correlate with the student's moral and spiritual development and are adapted to meet differences in memorizing ability.
3. Are taught meaningfully and enjoyably.
4. Are meaningfully applied to the life of the student.

The Bible Is Right is on May 16, 2027. Pastor leads a special celebration during the Sunday School "hour". Each class will share its memory verses with the congregation during the worship services.

MITTEN TREE

COMMUNITY BIN IN THE NARTHEX

Members of our congregation donate food and paper products. Each week the donations are delivered to the CommUnity (formerly Crisis Center). The congregation is very generous as it amounts to several tons of items each year, including the VBS donation of approximately 800 items.

BEST DAY BOX

Members of our congregation donate a box of cake mix and a container of frosting. This is paired with a baking pan, a can of soda and directions to bake a cake assembled by our committee to benefit the CommUnity Food Bank. This is designed to allow families to celebrate special moments such a birthday, anniversary, a new job, or moving into a new home.

COMMUNITY SPREAD THE LOVE CAMPAIGN



February is the CommUnity Spread the Love Campaign peanut butter and jelly drive. Notices are put in our weekly newsletter and signs are posted. The peanut butter and jelly collected during the month of February are delivered to CommUnity in early March.

SOCTOBER



October is **Soctober**. For people without permanent housing, feet work overtime when there isn't a warm home to return to each night. Socks are not often donated, yet new socks are like gold to homeless people. The congregation is asked to donate new crew socks (dark are preferred) with a reinforced toe. Notices will be put in our weekly newsletter and signs will be posted. The socks will be delivered to CommUnity in early November.

EMERGENCY FUNDS

Funds are available through Human Care as a grant or a loan for members of Our Redeemer who may be experiencing a short-term emergency. Examples could be a fire, loss of job, medical emergency, etc., when a few extra dollars could help carry someone through. Requests for funds should be made by contacting Pastor Hartwig who will then contact the appropriate people from the Human Care Committee.

BIRTHDAY CARDS

Cards, signed by the members of the committee, are sent to congregation members 75 years of age and older.

SYMPATHY CARDS

Cards are sent to the families of members of the congregation who have passed away.

CARE PROJECT

This is a program where members of Our Redeemer can contact Human Care if they need some short-time help, such as small household chores. A volunteer list of people who are willing to help is maintained to assist when a request is made.

UNDIES SUNDAY



This campaign runs the entire month of June. Members of our congregation donate clean/new underwear for men, women, and children. The committee donates collected items to the Iowa City Shelter House. Human Care is proud and thankful to have Our Redeemer leading the way in being the first to establish this type of campaign for much-needed and most-requested items benefitting the homeless.

OUTREACH

- Angel Tree Project: provides opportunities for Our Redeemer members to purchase, wrap, and deliver Christmas gifts from incarcerated parents to their children.

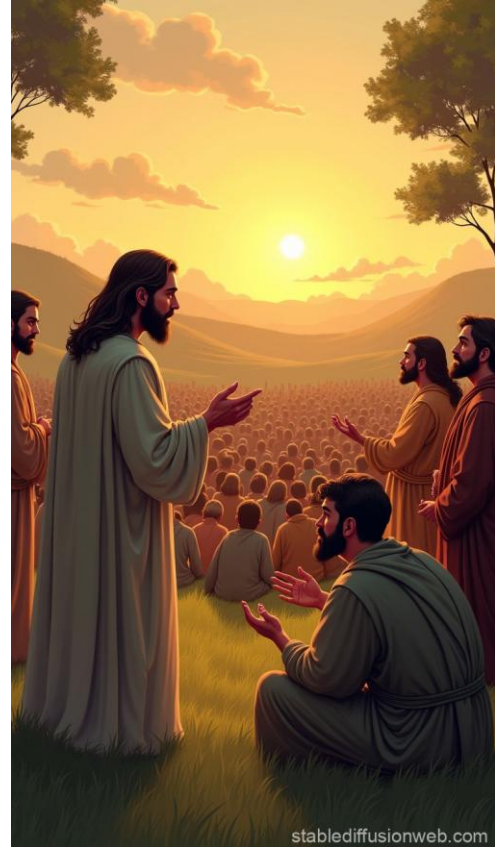

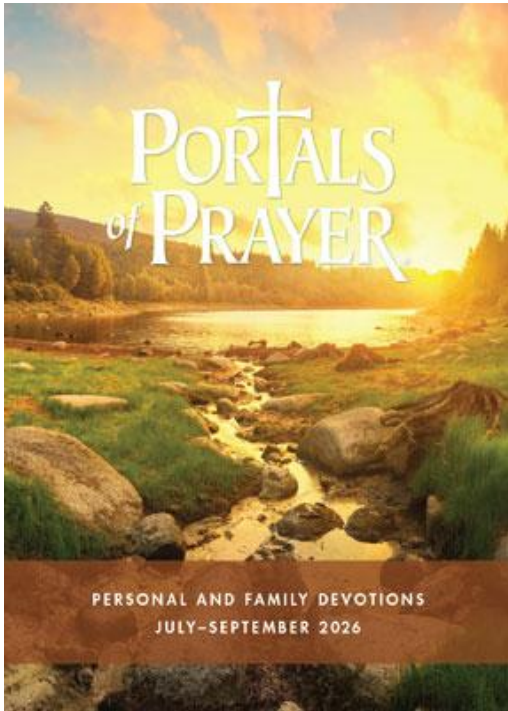
To provide a way to stay in communication with one another, each member family of Our Redeemer is assigned a communication box located in the hallway opposite the nursery.

Bringing Out the Best of the Body of Christ (Stewardship Sermon Series)

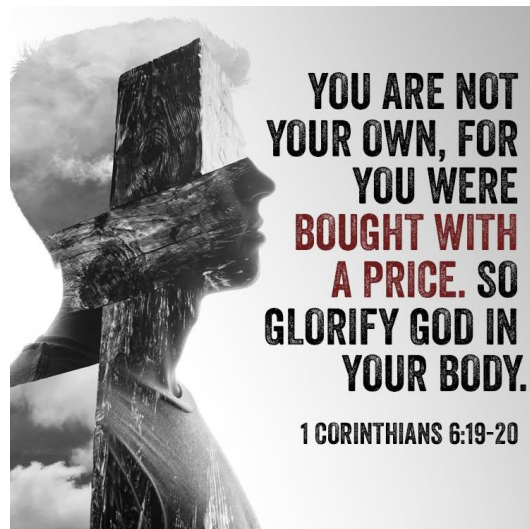

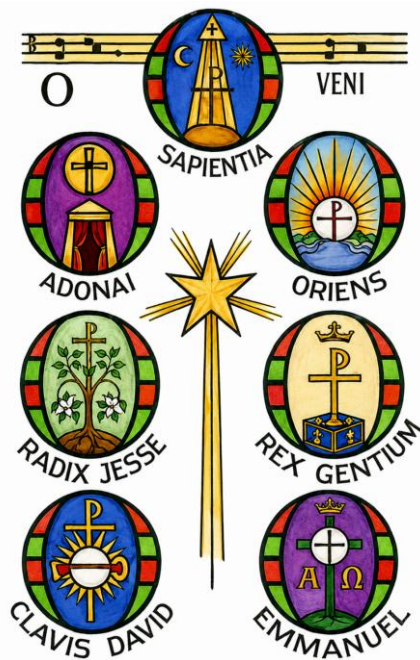

O Come, O Come, Body of Christ (Advent Sermon Series))

O Come, O Come, Emmanuel has long been a favorite hymn for Christians during the season of Advent. Each stanza of this hymn is inspired by the church's celebration of the O Antiphons. The O Antiphons are seven Messianic titles from the Old Testament that find their fulfillment in Jesus' person and work. Written in Latin – as seen in the graphic below – the first letter of each title in reverse creates the acrostic phrase *ERO CRAS* "Tomorrow, I will come." The practice of the church going back to the 8th century was to spend each day leading up to Christmas meditating on each distinct title of Christ in anticipation of His coming.



On Sundays and Wednesdays throughout the season of Advent, Our Redeemer will join with the Body of Christ – Christians spanning from the days of Moses to Isaiah to today – who adored and anticipated our God who tabernacled among us bodily. Each day will be devoted to a specific O

Antiphon, and meditation will be guided by Scripture and its accompanying stanza from *O Come, O Come, Emmanuel*.

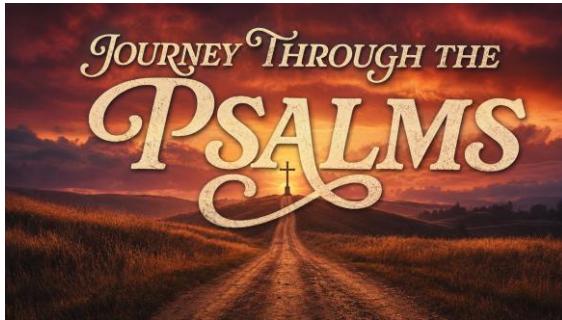

Journey through the Psalms (Lenten Sermon Series)



In the Psalms, we experience the poetic prayers the Body of Christ has cherished across time. These prayers are emotional, highly imaginative, and dripping with beauty. David, the prototype of the people of God, foresaw the life of Christ. David speaks chiefly of Jesus in these perfect prayers; however, Christ also speaks in and through the Body with the Psalms to guide God's people in how to pray, think, and feel.

In this series, we will endeavor on a journey through the penitential season. Throughout the journey, the Body of Christ's "prayer book" will be used to encounter the Shepherd's guiding voice. Here, Jesus' voice in the Psalms will lead the flock (1) to reveal the importance of sorrow over our sin, (2) to provide us with language to express our grief, shame, and distress, and (3) to deliver His life-giving Word of promise that enables us to trust in God's deliverance.

BAPTISM

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

We believe the Bible teaches that a person is saved by God's grace alone through faith in Jesus Christ. Baptism is one of the miraculous means of grace through which God creates and/or strengthens the gift of faith.

This Sacrament, explicitly commanded by God with His precious promises attached to it, is a powerful means of grace by which God grants faith and the forgiveness of sins.

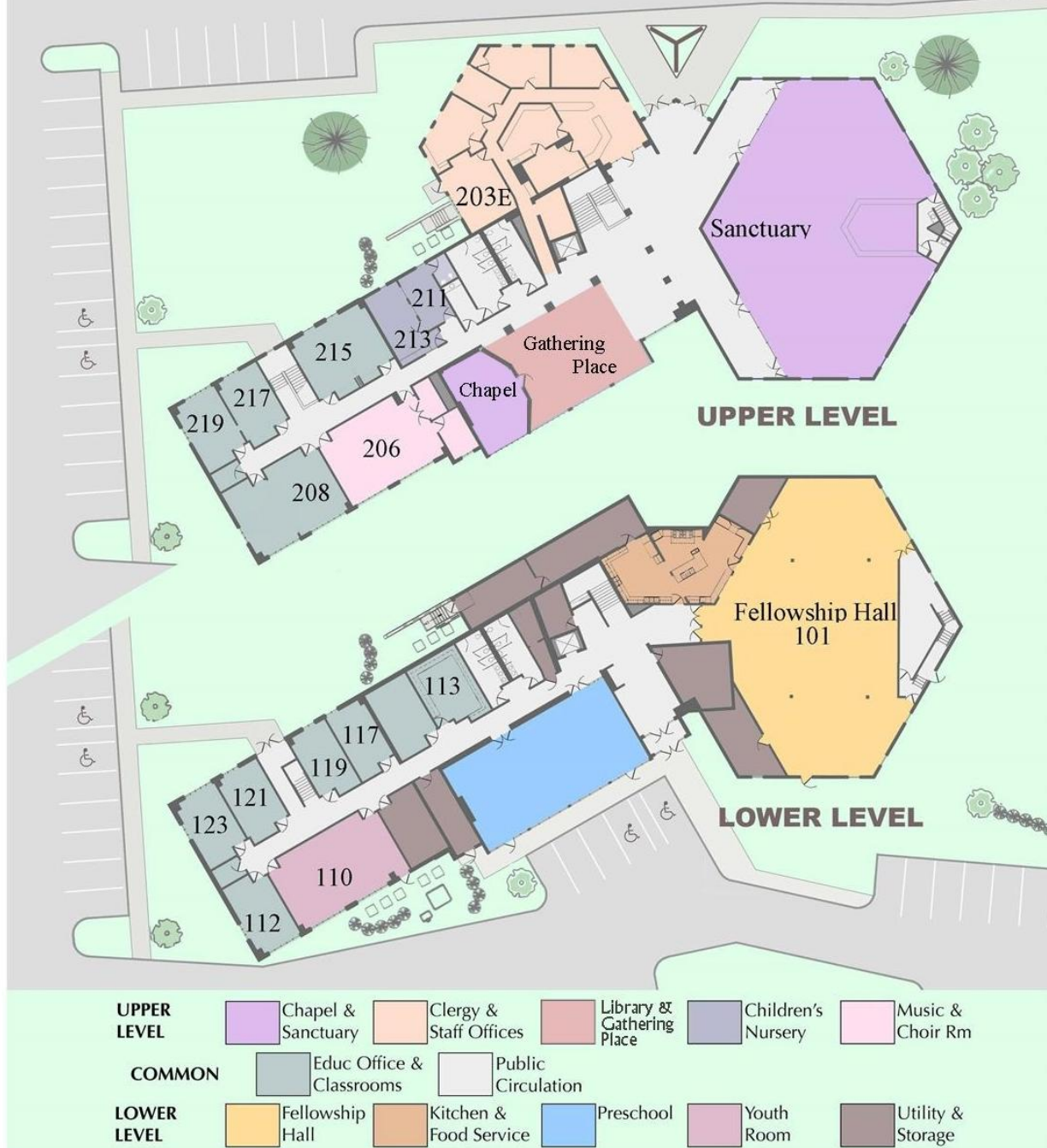

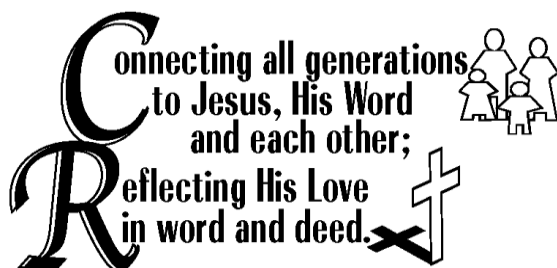

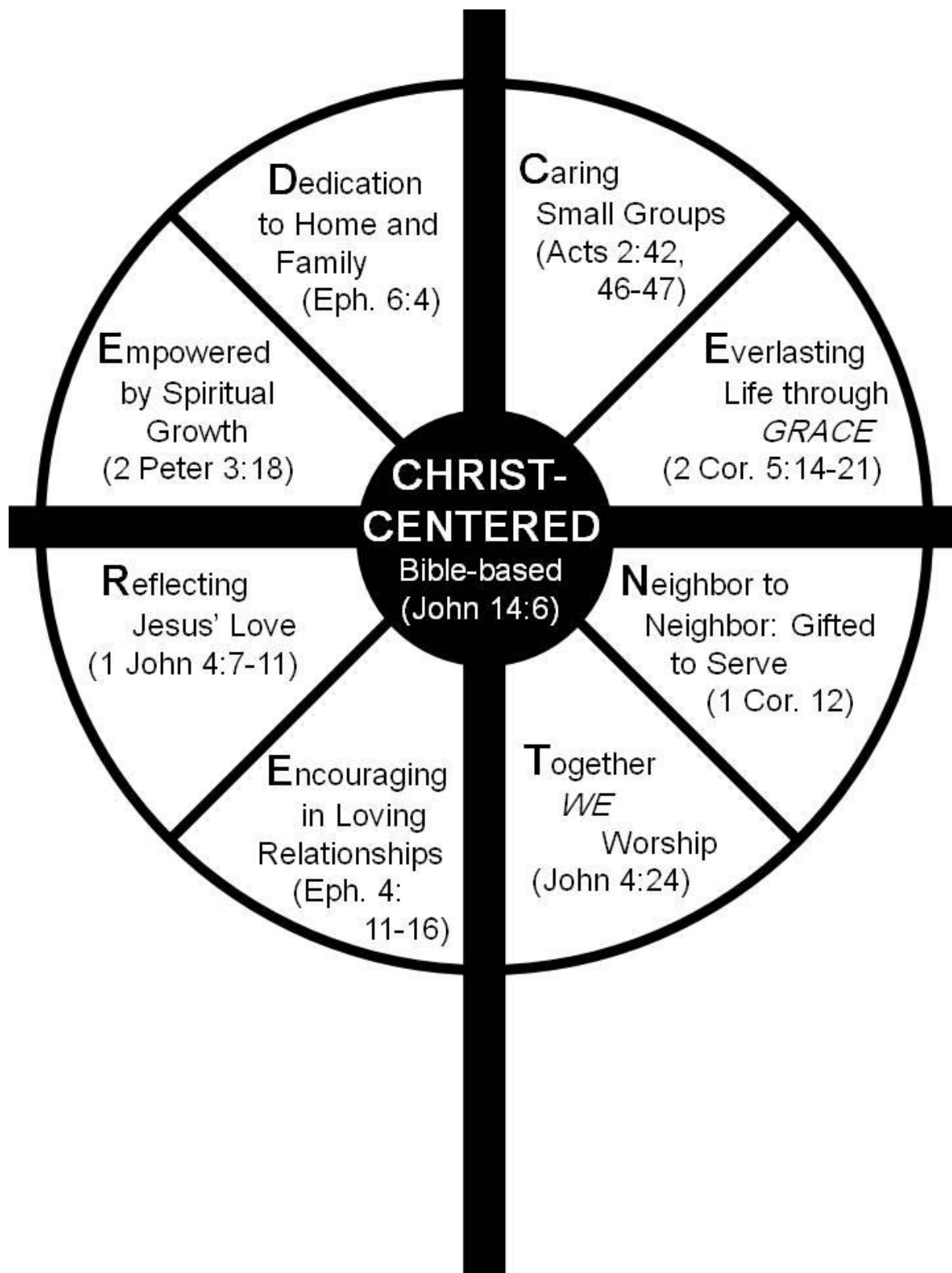

In this Divine Service, a variety of music swells to fill the liturgy. We sing and make melody in our hearts to the Lord through Christian music, hymns, and spiritual songs, according to Ephesians 5:19. Receiving the keynote from God, we sing in unison with one voice through Jesus Christ to the Father. As varied as our voices, a **myriad of instruments**—organ, bass, guitar, synthesizer, and drums come together in this Divine Service to harmoniously sing praises to the Lord.
